- Black Walnut Cake 1/2 cup fat 1 1/4 cups sugar 2-3 cups black walnuts 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 cup milk 3 cups flour 3 teaspoons baking powder 4 egg whites, beaten Cream fat and sugar. Add vanilla, salt, milk, flour and baking powder. Beat two minutes. Fold in nuts and egg whites. Pour into two cake pans lined with waxed papers. Bake 30 minutes in moderately slow oven. Cool and frost.

- Bettina Frosting 3 cups light brown sugar 1 1/2 cups water 3 egg whites, beaten 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/4 teaspoon salt Mix sugar and water. Boil over moderate fire without stirring until a portion, when tested in cold water, "clicks" when hit against the side of a cup. Pour into beaten egg whites. Beat until thick. Cool. Add rest of ingredients. Frost the cake. This frosting has delicious flavor. Blends especially well with nut mixtures.

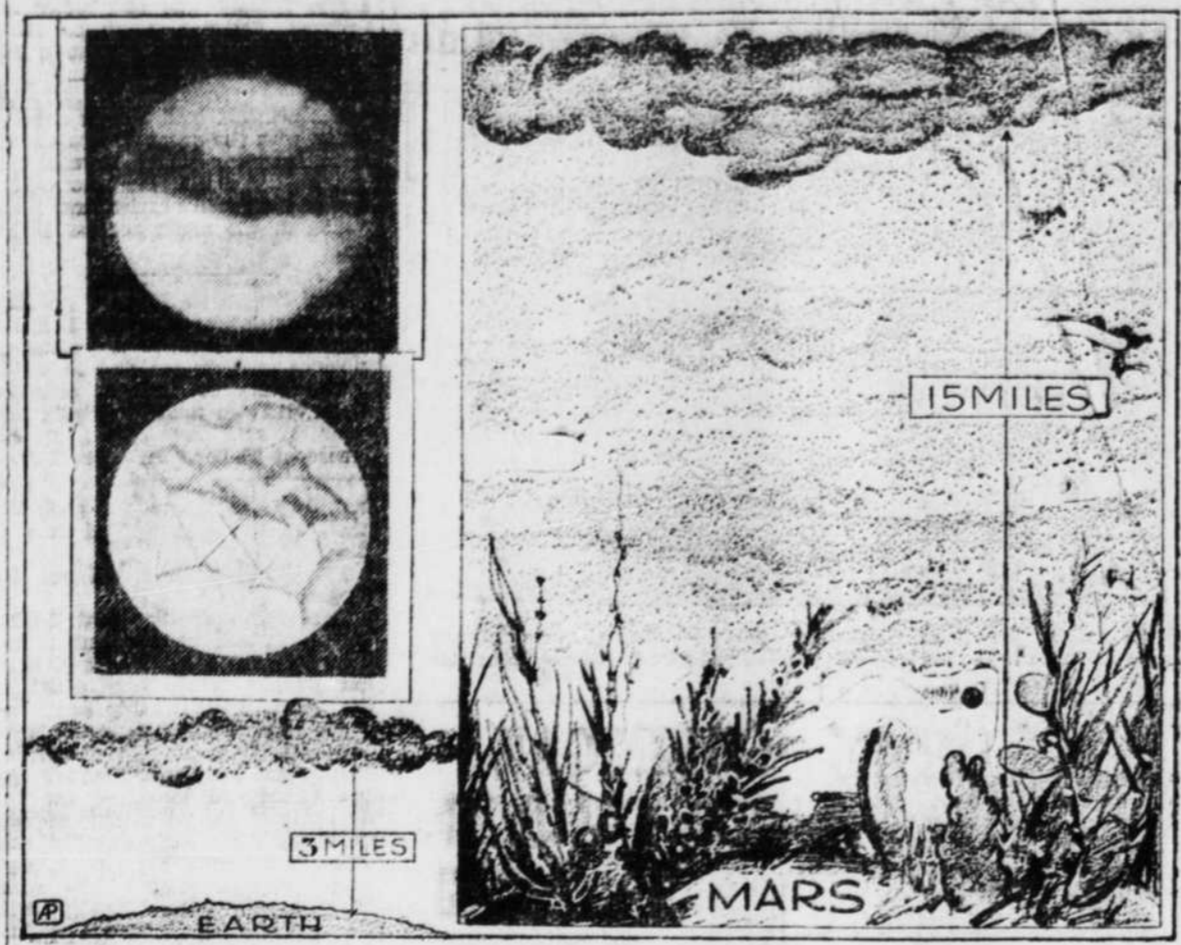

White Canes Aid Rochester Blind

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Jan. 30. (AP)—Blind residents of Rochester are now provided with white canes to aid in identifying them. The police department cooperated in the work by ordering patrolmen to watch for and assist the users of the canes. Residents were also asked to help. If a blind person likes a particular cane he now has, it will be painted white for him. With the exception of New York City, Rochester is the home of more blind persons than any other city in the state, police officials said. 'Weathermen' For Mars At Arizona Telescope Map 'Summer Resorts' 40 Million Miles Away



With Mars again near earth, Lowell observatory astronomers have renewed the study of the red planet's mysteries. By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE (Associated Press Science Editor) FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Jan. 30. (AP)—A 35-year-old quest to solve the riddles of Mars has been renewed at the Lowell observatory this winter.

Now, while the red planet is closest to earth, the 24-inch telescope nightly swings toward Mars, directed by E. C. Sipher, Lowell astronomer, who is making the Martian study his life work. There are four divisions of these observations. The chief study is change of seasons and all related matters. They are more regular on Mars than on earth. Spring, summer, winter and fall arrive always within two or three days of the same date. It is suspected the general absence of large bodies of water gives this great regularity to the Martian calendar, which has long been well recorded. Other observations will carry forward the making of a complete photographic record which began in 1905. This affords a valuable permanent record of the planet throughout the years. Another will record temperatures by regional readings, not only for zones such as temperature or torrid, but figuratively country by country—if there are national boundaries on Mars. These readings are made with a thermocouple, an instrument capable of recording the heat from a single star too faint for the eye to see. This is done by Dr. C. O. Lampland. The temperature readings confirm previous evidence by Dr. Percival Lowell that Mars alone among planets shows undoubted signs of a climate like earth's. Mars reflects only 15 per cent of the sun's light, compared with 50 per cent reflection by the earth, and this accounts for Mars absorbing about the same amount of heat, although approximately 40 million miles farther from the sun. The fourth work is analysis of Mars' light through a spectroscopic which breaks up light into its wave lengths, or colors, and shows what substances are involved in the reflection. This is one method of detecting water and oxygen. Thus far no great difference from earth's air has been observed, except as Lowell many times noted the atmosphere is less dense on Mars. The presence of this Martian atmosphere is not merely a scientific deduction. For more than a quarter of a century clouds have been observed and measured by Lowell and others at Flagstaff, where sometimes they have been seen as high as 15 to 17 miles above the planet's surface. One such "storm" lasted through four nights of observing in 1922 and covered more than 300,000 square miles. Martian clouds hang higher than earth's probably because the lesser gravitation pull on Mars does not compress the atmosphere so closely. The "canals" still are mysteries, but the observations indicate strongly that they may be ribbons of vegetable growth.

GUIDING YOUR CHILD

By MRS. AGNES LYNE DESTRUCTIVENESS All children go through a phase of what seems like destructiveness to their elders. This "destructiveness" is, however, only a normal manifestation of the desire to manipulate, experiment and discover. The wish to "take things apart" is one evidence of intelligence. When it seems that your child is forever breaking things, look over his playthings carefully. See if you have provided him with sufficient material of the kind which satisfies his need for experimental activity. Certain types of playthings definitely stimulate destructiveness. These are chiefly mechanical toys which permit of only a limited type of play. A toy which works by concealed mechanism naturally causes the child to wonder how it is made. He takes it apart to satisfy his curiosity or for the simple satisfaction of making things happen. This should be a sign that he needs other kinds of playthings. Every young child should have large wooden floor blocks with which he may build up and break down. Where living arrangements permit it, they should have sand and clay and a pile of assorted shapes and sizes of wood. Even in the most cramped quarters there is room for a hammer, a few blocks of wood and a small box of pebbles which the child will enjoy pounding and crushing which the mood to make things happen is upon him. For slightly older children there are structural sets which direct their love for experimentation along proper lines.

Says Women's Legs In America Beautiful

Gowns of Lace and 10-Yard Trains Glorify Pre-Lenten Brides in Paris

By BARBARA BEAUFORT (Associated Press Fashion Editor) PARIS, Jan. 30 (AP)—The lacy product of the silkworm's cocoon smoothes the butterfly brides who march to flower-banked marriage altars these days. "Lace from head to toe," seems to be the final fashion edict for the orange blossom atmosphere. As the weeks between New Year's and Lent become increasingly popular for fashionable weddings, Parisian dressmakers have worked overtime to give the pre-Lenten bride a chic all her own, with the result that some of the most beautiful wedding costumes of the decade have been evolved. Many a wedding gown is made entirely of creamy lace, with close-fitting bodice, long light sleeves and full skirt sweeping into a long train.

How long that train is depends upon the taste of the bride, varying all the way from two yards to ten. With such a gown the veil is generally a close-woven misty tulle, caught in a cap about the head and finished at the end with the same lace as that used in the bridal dress. One of the newest veils of ivory tulle falls over the face of the bride to her knees and sweeps eight yards behind her. It is fastened about the forehead with a band of tiny pearls. Supple satins, soft crepes and rich velvets are almost as popular as lace for wedding-gown materials. Almost without exception, however, the color is a shade just off white. Ivory, oyster and a pale pearl pink are the favorite tints for Parisian wedding gowns.
