MILBORNE, Australia, Feb. 3 (U.P.)—Meager details of death and destruction caused by a violent earthquake in the city of Napier, North Island, New Zealand, were flashed here today by wireless from ships in the vicinity of the stricken port.

Telephone and telegraph lines in Napier were down and the only information obtainable was from ships in the vicinity of the stricken port city of nearly 12,000 inhabitants.
