**Walter Plans Addition To City Library For Office**

The board of city commissioners, after looking the city over for proper quarters which might be rented for the office of the city clerk, have about decided to provide an office of their own.

The court house square belongs to the city and county for public use. The county owns the court building on the north end of the block now used for the city library.

City Building Inspector Paul Hosman, has been directed by the city board to prepare plans for an addition to the library building to house the city clerk's office. The addition would be on the east side of the building so that advantages can be taken of the concrete vault already built.

The cost of the addition is estimated at from \$1,500 to \$2,000. It is the intention of the board to have the new office ready by March 1 as the present quarters will be needed for the court when the United States Court sits in Las Vegas March 2.

### Foes of Thompson Shout Reform In Race For Chicago Mayor's Job

CHICAGO, Feb. 6. (AP)—Four major band-wagons are rumbling across Chicago's political stage as the city prepares to select its mayor for the next four years.

Opposing Mayor William Hale Thompson for the Republican nomination are John H. Lyle, municipal judge, and Alderman Arthur F. Albert. Anton J. Cermack, backed by Chicago's Democratic organization, is slated for nomination virtually without opposition.

"Big Bill the Builder," as Thompson has called himself, aspires to a fourth term in the city hall. Always a showman, his "stage program" this year include a halter which he exhibits at all campaign

### Country Club Election Is Postponed

The annual election of the Country Club, which was scheduled for last evening, has been postponed indefinitely. It was announced yesterday. It is probable the meeting will be held within the next two weeks.

An incident to the next meeting is that the incumbent will serve during the "century of progress" world's fair of 1933.

Lyle, once a Thompson supporter in the city council, declared it "ridiculous that all the law enforcement agencies of Cook county annihilate the little bands of sizzling, cowardly assassins headed by Capone, Moran, Druggan and McElrath."

He fixed unprecedented bonds of \$50,000 and \$100,000 when "public enemies" as outstanding gangsters are racketeers were designated, were brought before him.

Lyle carries the support of the county chairman, Barney Snow, the Barrett faction, the Brundage group and other anti-Thompson organizations.

Albert bears the standard of the Democ wing of the Republicans. He called Lyle's efforts "publicity."

Thompson claims he has fulfilled all campaign promises, which include settlement of traction problem and elimination of "English influence" in schools.

The last pledge inspired the mayor's trade four years ago against "the king of England."

Thompson first ran for office 30 years ago when a reform organization, the Municipal Voters' League, proposed the husky yachting son of a millionaire rector for alderman from the second ward. He won.

In 1912 he was defeated for the board of review, but in 1915 he was elected mayor. He won again in 1919 and in 1927.

Although reared in luxury, accustomed to wealth, Thompson's appeal has been s illiterate with the poor and the illiterate—the masses.
