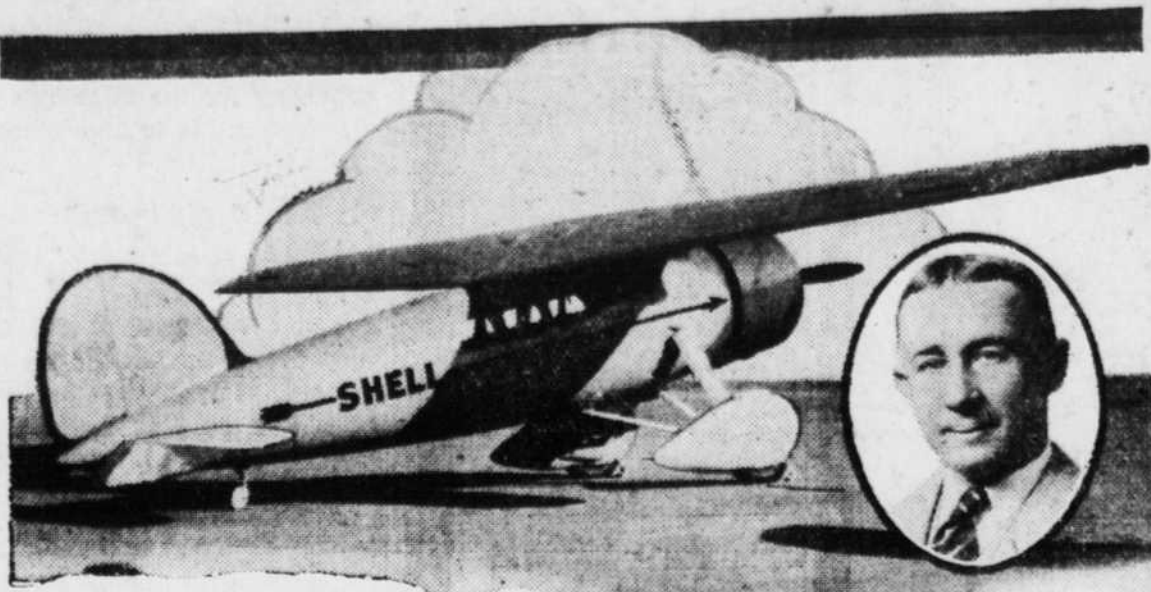

MacCreedy Flies Here For Shell Oil Company

Capt. John H. MacCreedy, a Searchlight, Nev., boy, who made good in the U. S. (with apologies to O. O. M.) flew into Las Vegas yesterday afternoon in his seven-passenger Lockheed Vega plane with wisp motor. The trip from San Francisco was made in four hours, with a half hour stop at Bakersfield.

MacCreedy, altitude ace, first transcontinental flier between San Diego and New York, and with a whole string of army honors, is now head of the aviation department of the Shell Oil company.

This berth is not, as someone might suggest, just a publicity stunt for the Shell company, but is a real job, at which MacCreedy is, to quote one of his associates, "very active." He has charge of all activities pertaining to aviation, and has his headquarters in the San Francisco office.

He was accompanied by two passengers, Clarence Rose of the aviation department and R. P. Barnard of the advertising department.

ROLPH SAYS CALIFORNIA-ARIZONA ENMITY AT END AFTER VISIT WITH HUNT

California Governor All "Pepped Up" Over "Reconciliation" With Arizona Executive

By CABLE H. BENNETT (United Press Staff Correspondent) LOS ANGELES, Feb. 9. (AP)—The states of California and Arizona have "made up" again after quarreling for two years and the governor of one has told the governor of the other what a fine thing he thinks it will be for both.

While making a 2,000 mile air tour of the southwest, Gov. James Rolph, Jr. of California dropped in at Phoenix for a Sunday afternoon call on Gov. G. W. P. Hunt, found out what the "scrapping" had been about, and the two agreed that it should be dropped.

"A governor of California declined to receive a commission from Arizona and since that time diplomatic relations have been severed so far as Arizona was concerned," Gov. Hunt explained to Gov. Rolph, who recently took office and who had been a bit curious about the origin of the "scrapping" as Hunt explained it.

"Your visit here has removed all that background," Hunt told Rolph. "After years of turmoil we now can be friendly."

In reply, the governor of California said to the governor of Arizona: "I'll change all that misunderstanding now and your delegations will be received hereafter."

Gov. Rolph later remarked that he regarded the meeting as marking a "new era" for both states.

It generally was believed that the first important result of the "reconciliation" would be a speeding up of construction of Boulder dam on the Colorado river.

Twelve hours prior to the visit with Gov. Hunt, California's chief executive had received from Governor Carlos Y. Lerbo de Tejada of Baja California, Mexico, northern division, another pledge of friendship.

The Governor of Baja California had visited Gov. Rolph first in El Centro and Gov. Rolph, with authorization from the state legislature, went into Mexicali late Saturday night to complete the formalities.

"The greatest desire of my people is to imitate the type of culture that is in the United States," Governor de Tejada said.

Gov. Rolph then invited his guest to visit him in Sacramento. "I will send an airplane for you or my new automobile," he said.

The governor will remain here today and return to San Francisco tomorrow, ending there a four day flight.

SPECIFICATIONS SHOW NEW BOULDER CITY HOMES TO BE MODERN IN EVERY RESPECT

Mead Makes Public Plans For Residences Which Will House From Three To Five Thousand Persons

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9. (AP)—Homes in Boulder City, the model town the government is building for Hoover dam workers, will be complete in every detail, even to a place in the kitchen for laundry tubs.

Detailed plans for three and four room residences that will provide sleeping quarters for between three and five thousand persons call for a space for the tubs electrical refrigerator, built-in ironing board, broom and linen closets and an ample breakfast room.

The three room houses will have one bedroom and the four room houses will include two bedrooms. Hollow concrete and hollow tile walls are called for in the plans which were made public today by Commissioner Mead of the Reclamation bureau.

Between Council Grove and Hoisington, Kas., on the Rock Island railroad, are stations named after Charles Comiskey's old-time White Sox team members.
