### 35 Firemen Are Overcome

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Feb. 13 (AP)—Thirty-five firemen were under treatment in hospitals today after sixty had been overcome by carbon monoxide fumes while fighting a fire last night. Nearly all apparatus in the city found the blaze in the basement of a clothing store built over the Genesee River. Deputy Chief Rollin W. Pitts, in the command of the firemen, reported more than 150 gallons of fuel oil was blazing in the basement. Contact of this oil with flames generated the carbon monoxide gas which mowed down the firemen, he explained. A four hour battle and the tons of water poured into the basement of the building finally extinguished the flames.

### Drivers At Fault In Most Accidents

Drivers of automobiles were responsible last year for more than three times as many motor vehicle accidents in this country as pedestrians, more than two times the number of fatalities, and for approximately four times the number of persons injured. While the major portion of the blame is thus placed upon motorists for the country's automobile accident toll which last year cost the lives of 32,500 and included the injuring of more than 900,000, the pedestrian is more often at fault in the accidents involving himself, according to an analysis of state reports extended through mathematical calculation by the Travelers Insurance company to cover the entire country. Out of a total of more than 323,000 accidents between automobiles and pedestrians, the actions of drivers were definitely responsible for around 90,000 of the mishaps and the pedestrians for nearly 150,000. In the remaining 110,000 accidents between cars and pedestrians the responsibility was shared jointly.

More than 7,000 pedestrians met death during the year primarily through their own fault, while approximately 2,300 other pedestrians were killed because of the actions of drivers. In the death of more than 5,000 other pedestrians, the responsibility was shared jointly. The injuring of more than 150,000 persons was found traceable to the actions of pedestrians, and more than 45,000 to motorists, with more than 110,000 injuries due to the actions of both. In all other motor vehicle accidents, excluding pedestrians, it was found that the driver was responsible for around 460,000 mishaps, or nearly nine times the number in which the extent of responsibility was doubtful. The fatalities resulting from the mishaps caused by drivers numbered nearly 15,000, or nearly five times the deaths caused by the mishaps of doubtful responsibility. The injuries traceable to motorists numbered more than 393,000, as against 58,000 involving doubtful responsibility.

The things which pedestrians do that are wrong include crossing intersections against a signal light, crossing intersections diagonally, crossing in the middle of a block, hitch hiking, darting out into thoroughfares from behind parked cars, and walked with instead of against the traffic stream on dark highways after sundown. Such actions caused the death of more than 5,000 last year. Actions of motorists which place the responsibility upon them involve driving into pedestrians crossing intersections with the signal in their favor, hitting persons getting on or off street cars or waiting in safety aisles, hitting persons engaged in work on roadways or beside roadways. In such instances as when persons are walking in roadways, crossing intersections without signals, getting on or off vehicles other than automobiles and street cars, and in the playing of children in streets, the responsibility is not always clear-cut. The fault is indicated as belonging to the motorist in the collision of cars, the collision of cars with fixed objects, and in non-collision mishaps. The fault is not clear-cut in the mishaps involving the collision of cars with animal-drawn vehicles, trains and street cars, motorcycles and bicycles.

### Eggs Fly At Chicago Mayor

CHICAGO, Feb. 13 (AP)—Two men's fists broke out this afternoon as hecklers interrupted the big mass meetings of "Big Bill" Thompson and Judge John H. Lyle, two of the four Republicans battling for the world's fair mayorship of the nation's second largest city. One heckler arose in the Thompson meeting, the Garrick Thompson called the mayor a "bind-skin" and then threw two eggs, one of which hit Thompson on the knee. The heckler was beaten by the hundreds of Thompson followers in the theatre, but finally was rescued and arrested by a flying wedge of policemen. Only a short time before a heckler challenged Judge Lyle in his meeting in the Apollo theatre, only a few dozen away from the Thompson meeting and was thrown out after much excitement.

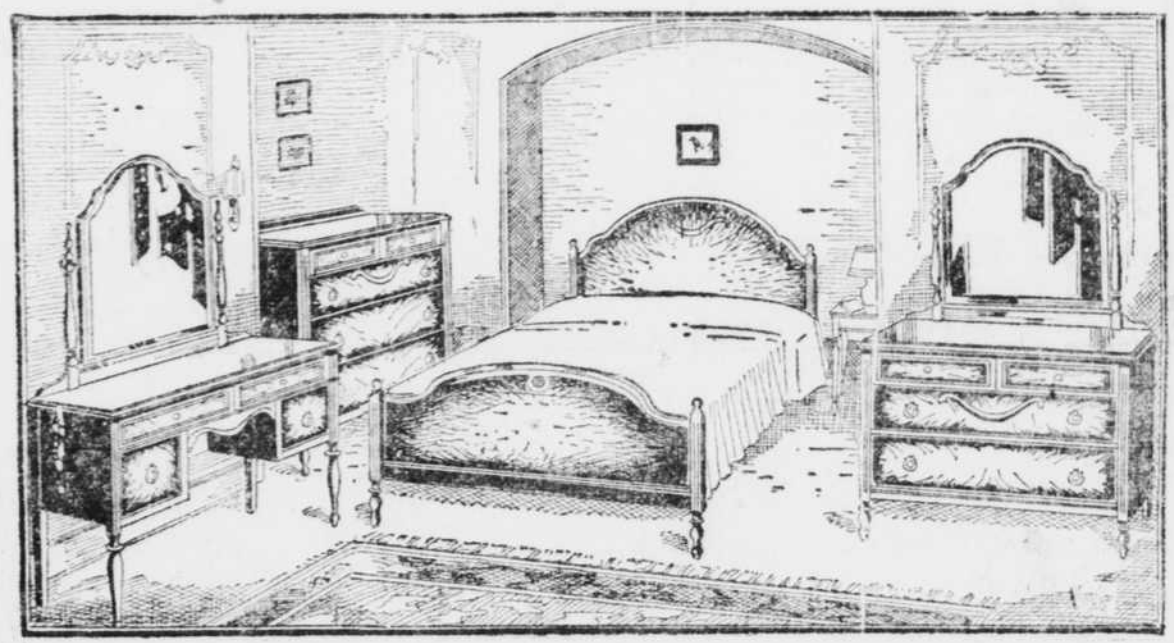

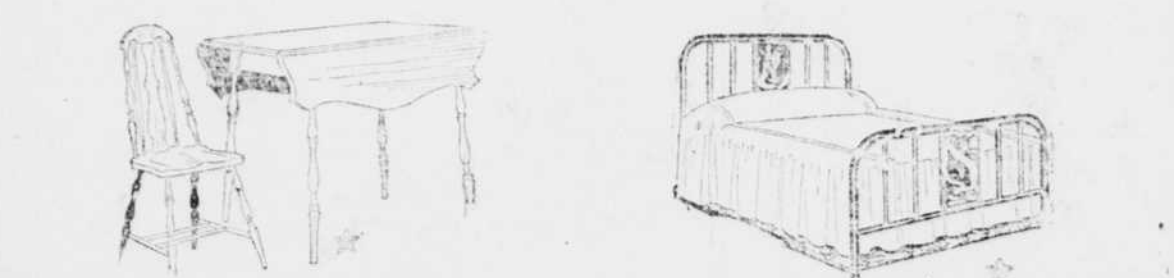
