### WASHINGTON HUSKIES QUIT FLASHY 'PONY' CAGERS IN NEW DRIVE AT COAST TITLE



The University of Washington has given up trying to win the West Coast basketball title with small, speedy players, Harold West, called a "Mizger" of the court, is the only man on the team not a six-footer. Kline Swygard and John Fuller, sophomore forwards, weigh more than 170 pounds each.

SEATTLE, Feb. 13 (AP)—The University of Washington Huskies are making their fourth successive attempt to win the Pacific Coast conference basketball championship.

The last three years the Washington quintet has captured the northern division title only to lose the coast crown in the playoff between the northern and southern sections.

This year the Huskies have won easily their first four games. Because of these victories the team again is a heavy favorite to top the northern division title with Oregon State college and Washington State college figured to supply the toughest opposition.

Lack of weight has been the main reason for Washington's poor showing against the California schools in the past, and as a consequence Coach "Doc" Edmondson banded together his heaviest quintet in many years this season.

In previous years Edmondson used several bantamweights on his squad. He molded lightning fast aggressions which faltered against too heavy opposition.

Edmondson has only one man on his first lineup this year who weighs less than 170 pounds or stands less than six feet. He is Harold West, 5 foot 8 inch guard who is a "Mizger" in a basketball suit.

He is the fastest man on the squad, a good shot and checks with the best of them.

Two sophomores, Kline Swygard

and John Fuller, are holding down the forward posts. Swygard weighs 173 pounds and Fuller 179. Both are clever floor men and accurate shots.

Henry "Hank" Swanson was shifted from forward to center with the passing of "Stork" McClary through graduation. Swanson is 6 feet 4 inches tall and weighs 172 pounds.

Bobby Cairney, 6 feet tall and 170 pounds, is West's mate. Cairney was an All-Coast guard last year.

He is a rugged type of player and makes a good partner for the diminutive West.

### Engineer Urges Plan To Create New Radio Bands

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—A plan for revision of the broadcast system has been submitted to congress and the federal radio commission by Lieut. Com. T. A. M. Craven.

It looks to an increase in the number of stations and to a greater program variety.

Craven, a naval radio expert, says the commission could, by requiring higher engineering standards in transmission and by adopting the "blue" principle of wavelength assignments, provide room for more stations. He also suggests that the government enjoin the co-operation of receiving set manufacturers in increasing set selectivity.

Greater selectivity, combined with "blue" assignments of frequencies, Craven says, would reduce crosstalk interference on adjacent channels. He also urges the commission to encourage synchronization of stations as a means of providing ad-

ditional wavelengths.

"If these measures are universally applied, it will be possible for most listeners ultimately to have good reception of two different national chain programs, two regional chain programs, and two programs of state interest," he said. "In addition there would be available one or more different programs of community interest."
