GUIDING YOUR CHILD

AGNES LYNE BEFORE BEDTIME A good deal of the difficulty which mothers find in persuading children to go to bed and to sleep promptly and cheerfully is due, to mismanagement of the hour immediately preceding bedtime. It is the hour when the adults are themselves in a relaxed and playful frame of mind. It is literally the only time when the average American father has a chance to play with his child. It therefore becomes a time for exciting games, high laughter and rough-and-tumble play. Never does the atmosphere of home seem so gay, never do children have more fun with their fathers and mothers, and with each other, than just before they must be driven into exile and oblivion. No wonder that they strenuously object, and that even when they are submissive, it takes an hour, or even two or three, before sleep comes to them. It is quite possible to prevent this without sacrificing the spirit of family comradeship which such bedtime play encourages. There are games which are not exciting, but good fun nevertheless. Bedtime is a good time for picture books, puzzles, sitting-down games and any sort of easy hand work. From such activities the child may go to his bed in the serenely happy mood which best induces sleep. Anything like nagging, correction or punishment is likely to make the child nervous, excited, and angry—feelings which tend to increase wakefulness, and to arouse resistance to any program that father or mother is bent on putting through. There are few, if any, disciplinary situations so crucial that they must be met and dealt with at the cost of proper rest. TROUBLED CITIZEN SENDS \$5 FOR "BORROWED TOOLS" PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 18. "MODERN" CHINA GOES, BUT SQUARE PLATES STAY

Of all the forms of china tableware that came in with the modern vogue for angularity, square plates alone have withstood the later trend towards older fashions and won a place in the new conservatism. Square plates held a commanding place this year in almost every exhibit at the trade show of the Association of Glass and Pottery Manufacturers, the show at which nearly all American makers lay their wares yearly before buyers for stores from coast to coast. Square plates led in table service of both glass and china. Not that the pure square rules. The square is but the general form, and variations are more numerous than the manufacturers' creating them.
