

KID FRANCIS WINNER OVER DANNY SHEA

Shea Hits Harder, But Francis Has Lots More of Them

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—Kid Francis of Italy won a decision over Danny Shea of Chicago in a ten round bout here last night. The fight was for the unofficial world featherweight championship as neither Francis nor Shea is held by boxing writers to be superior to the current title in the division. Christopher Battalino of Hartford, Conn. administered a knockout drubbing to Battalino in an over-weight bout in Chicago a few weeks back and tonight Francis scored an impressive victory over Battalino's conqueror.

Shea weighed 126 and Francis 122. Shea's blows were hard but Francis struck nearly two for every one registered by the Chicagoan. Francis was at his best in the third and tenth rounds.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 20 (AP)—Jack Sharkey, Boston heavyweight champion contender, arrived in Jack Dempsey's home town today to see what could be done about pepping up the fight situation in California.

Sharkey was accompanied by his manager, Johnny Buckley, and Ernie Schaaf, an eastern heavyweight, who recently took Max Baer, California's leading heavy.

Although Sharkey was met by a crew of cheering sailors from San Pedro and was presented with a megaphone and the keys to the city, he was not garrulous. Buckley did most of the talking.

"I doubt if Dempsey ever will fight again," said Buckley. "He told us when we met him in Florida he was afraid of damaging his eyes. He'll never come back as long as Jack is the leading contender."

Buckley said that Sharkey's big ambition was another crack at Max Schmeling, who won the world title when he was fouled by Sharkey.

Schaaf will face Dynamite Jackson, Los Angeles negro, in a 10-round bout next Tuesday at the Olympic auditorium. Sharkey will second Schaaf and will say in California a month or more with Schaaf if the first bout is successful, Buckley said.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—Baseball's annual migration to the south started in earnest today with New York's three major league clubs scheduled to enroute for training camp jaunts.

The Giants' party was scheduled to depart this afternoon, with Frank Hogan as the only resident member of the team in the group. Others will join en route to St. Louis and when the training camp is opened at San Antonio, Tex., Monday all candidates for battery positions are scheduled to be on hand.

Three rookie players will be included in the Yankees' delegation, of 30 which will enroute tonight for St. Petersburg, Fla. Manager Joe McCarthy and Coach Art Fletcher already are at camp and will put their charges through the opening workout Monday.

The Brooklyn club has no players in the metropolitan district and has not arranged an organized departure. Some of the Brooklyn writers and officials will accompany the Yankee's party as far as Clearwater, Fla.

Eighteen members of the Boston Braves left New York last night for St. Petersburg, Fla., in the first departure of a major league team for the south, although the Chicago Cubs and Pittsburgh Pirates already are encamped in California. Philadelphia's Athletics and Phillies are scheduled to head south Saturday and Tuesday, respectively, and when March first rolls around all major league clubs will be in training.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 20 (AP)—The University of Southern California ice hockey team maintained a clean slate for the year when it defeated Loyola university, 2 to 1, here last night in a southern California intercollegiate game.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 20 (AP)—Taking advantage of the absence of a star opponent, the San Francisco Blackhaws defeated the Los Angeles Millionaires, 3 to 0, in a California league ice hockey game here last night. The visitors were hampered by the loss of Wolf Pelzer, who was benched by injuries.

PASADENA, Feb. 20 (AP)—Joe Soldvar defeated Oral Eubanks in eight rounds here last night. Other bouts: Billy Wagner defeated Ben Moselle (4); Al Cadena and Jimmy O'Neill draw (4); Johnny O'Brien scored a technical knockout over Jack Van Noy (2); San Francisco Luton defeated Bruce McDowell (4).

NICE, France, Feb. 20 (AP)—Edward Mayo, representing J. Frank Gould, was en route to New York today, to offer \$750,000 for a world heavyweight championship fight on the Riviera in August.

Gould, American millionaire and owner of several gambling casinos, believes a match between Primo and the Schmeling-Striling winner would be a good investment to attract persons to his casinos.

Mayo has been instructed to offer Jack Dempsey \$15,000 to referee the contest.

Bank Pays Big Sum For Return Of Stolen Loot

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 20 (AP)—The \$822,000 in bonds stolen in the robbery of safe deposit vaults of the Grand National Bank here on May 25, 1930, have been recovered in return for payment of \$140,000 in cash through an underworld channel. It was confirmed today by Joseph Ledbetter, vice president of the bank.

The banks vaults were looted on a Sunday morning, a few hours before all securities and valuables were to be transferred to the bank's new building.

Jewelry and cash valued at \$100,000 were taken in addition to the bonds. These have not been recovered.

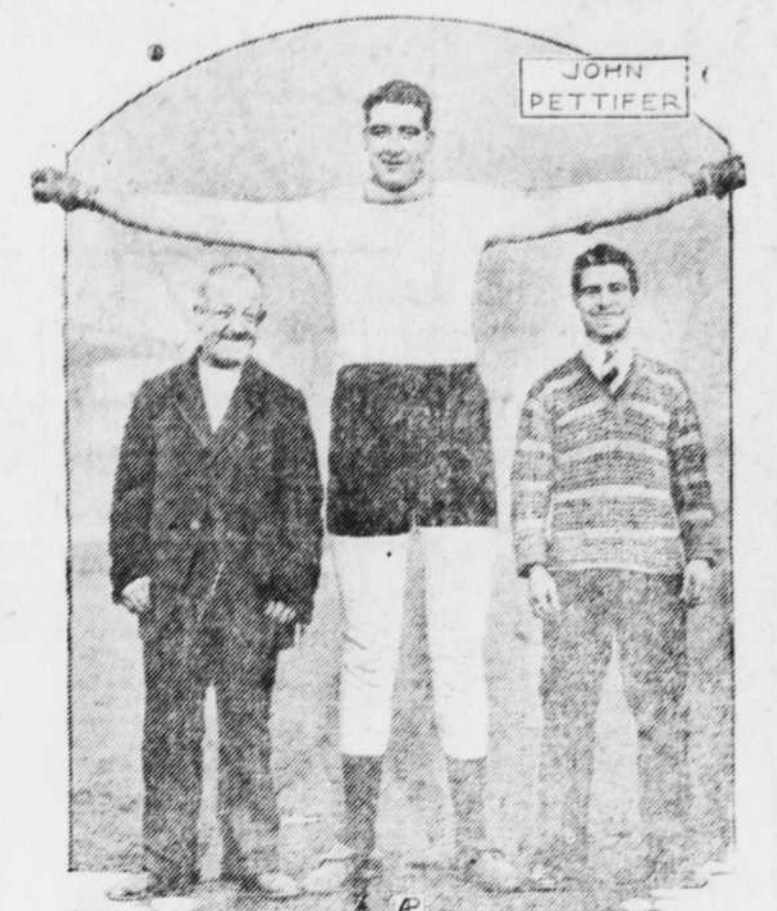
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NEW "CARNERA" TO IMITATE MIKE GIBBONS' RING STYLE

LONDON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Little Jack Pettifer, the British Ajax, is getting ready to hunt for lightning in the ring.

Little Jack is only 21, but he stands 6 feet 6 1/2 inches and weighs 17 stones (238 pounds), in training. From finger tip to finger tip he measures 22 1/2 inches and his bicep is 17 1/2 inches around. His forearm is 14 1/2 inches, neck 18 1/2, waist 37 1/2, chest 28, calf 13, chest (normal) 43 1/2, and (expanded) 48 inches.

As a matter of fact, Jack is just getting under way in his ring career. He has been fighting less than 12 months and has had only five professional bouts. He won all of these and says old George McDonald, his trainer "wasn't scratched."

Despite the fact that he has been boxing such a short time Pettifer has gathered a strong following and topped the bill every time he has appeared.

He was a little clumsy at first, as most big boys are, but he is getting over this, and has learned to fight with sharp chopping blows to the head. McDonald's hope is that he can make a giant edition of Mike Gibbons out of him, rather than a ring curio.

"You see," McDonald explained, "Jack hasn't got big feet (size 12 shoe) which lets him do some foot-

work. Then he hasn't got ropey muscles, either, he's smooth and fast."

None of his fights has been won by a knockout, but he has won every round since he climbed through the ropes.

Jack used to be a shipbreaker. Then he was a dishwasher. He's a good-humored, good looking kid with an intelligent face and likes to read poetry. In fact he can quote some. He doesn't drink or smoke and is single.

Jack's father was big, but his mother was a little woman. He has a sister around his size—14 stone.

McDonald expects to bring him to New York as soon as things look bright—probably this spring. "He has refused offers for his contract," he says, "because it will be fun for me to take Jack to America in my old age."
