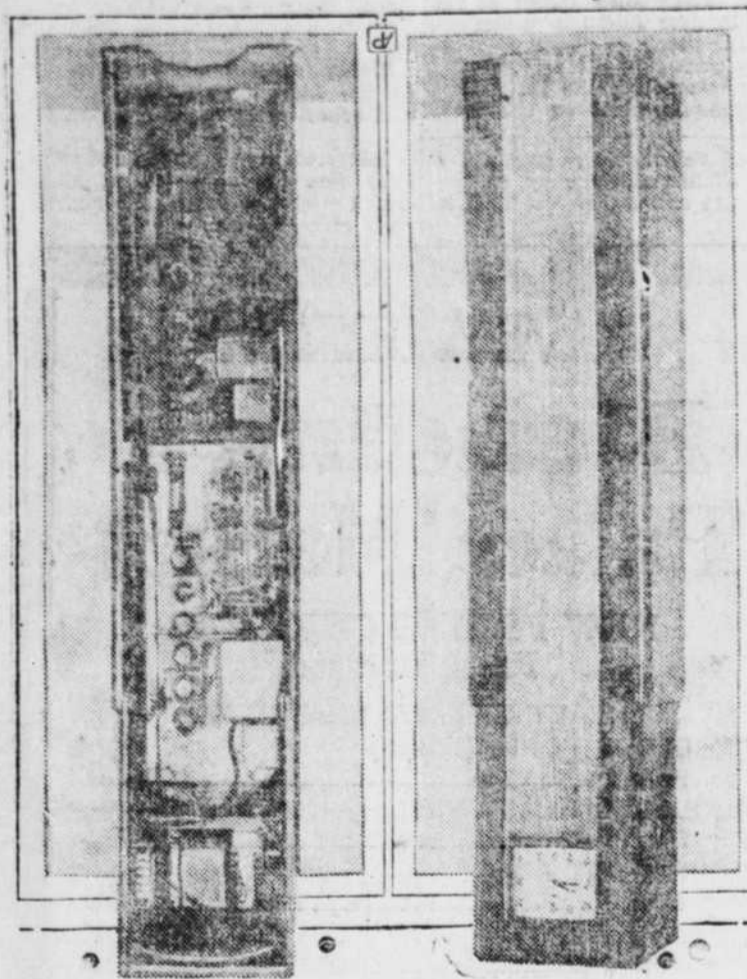


### Grandfather's Clock Cabinet Conceals New Radio Model



This new model closely resembles a small grandfather's clock. but a rear view (right) reveals that it is really a radio set.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—The "skyscraper" receiver has made its appearance to bring the season something new in radio design.

The new receiver is somewhat revolutionary in design, its outward appearance resembling that of a condensed grandfather's clock. Looking at the set in place against the wall, all that can be seen is a clock face in the top of a cabinet which stands five feet high and takes up only a square foot of floor space.

In putting radio apparatus into such a cabinet, engineers found it necessary to place the equipment against the front wall, standing the chassis on end, so to speak.

The loudspeaker is in the top and the five-foot column of air in the cabinet is used as an adjunct to sound reproduction. The speaker thus is taken from the front of the cabinet, and engineers say that better distribution of music through a room is thus obtained.

In addition to housing the receiver, the cabinet contains an electric clock operated by signals sent over the house lighting circuits.

Radio controls are on one side of the cabinet, with provision in one model for remote control tuning.

The accomplishment has saved the director several delays. For talkie actors forget their lines, or become mixed up quite a bit; it is

different from the stage, where there is a great deal of time to practice.

Miss Kelly learned the sign language as a child, to converse with an old gentleman her family was supporting. Miss Kimball has been connected with two institutions for the instruction of deaf mutes.
