Although the session is short, being scheduled to end today, it has saved Las Vegas defendants a pretty sum in travel expenses. So that Uncle Sam probably collected enough more in fines to pay the expense of the court's travel here and back. And also, the defendants being put to less expense and being able to pay their fines, the expense of keeping them in jail is avoided.

PROBATION PLAN

JUDGE NORCROSS is trying out the installment plan of fine-paying in such cases as he is convinced deserveleniency.
