HOOVER REACHES MID-TERM— PRESIDENT'S FIGHTING SPIRIT GROWS IN TWO YEAR'S STRIFE

WASHINGTON, March 2. (AP)— Beset by national emergencies such as few peace-time Presidents have known, Herbert Hoover approached the midpoint of his administration with the mark of those two years of terrific stress indelibly upon him. The mark is to be seen in the new lines etched deeply into his face. It shows in the thinning, swiftly-whitening hair. These are the price of power; the inescapable tribute that he who holds the presidency must pay to nature for the crushing weight of responsibility endured night and day, waking or sleeping. Yet, despite these tokens of the strain of his office, the skilled eye of his physician finds Mr. Hoover, after two years in the presidency, a better man physically than the bulkier, less careworn Hoover who assumed his new duties on that rainy March 4 of 1929.

Forces Set to Exercise
Persistent exercise, enforced against his natural taste, has cut away surplus poundage that might be dangerous in a man of his years and habit. Rigid restraint upon diet have helped. And probably most of all the fleeting week-end relaxations in his fishing camp amid the Virginia hills, with hours given to the silent self-communication that goes with rod and reel, have helped to keep him braced for the ordeal of the presidency. For President Hoover has found no time for real vacations. A single Florida fishing trip has broken into the grinding routine of his 24-months as President.

Business a Major Problem
Still, for all its hardships, the drought was but an item in the appalling spectacle upon which President Hoover looked during the first two years of his presidency. Swiftly crystallizing from the hour of the stock market crash of 1929, a world-wide cycle of business depression and unemployment still offers problems to be faced, whatever hopeful signs economists may see for brightening business skies.

Politically speaking, those first two Hoover years were fraught with happenings seemingly almost as momentous as the depression or drought. They witnessed the election of a new congress in which Republican party majorities in both houses, on the heels of Mr. Hoover's own great victory of 1928, were all but swept away. Problems of party leadership appear certain to be more complicated.

BUFFALO, N. Y., March 2. (AP)— Erie county has a decidedly popular penitentiary. The penitentiary is located at Wende, 18 miles west of Buffalo. One reason for its popularity is that when not working, the inmates are free to visit about in the cell blocks, or rest in their grey-blue cells. The days are not entirely play, however, for park benches, ballot boxes, caskets, and clothing for use in county institutions are made here entirely by the inmates. Complete idleness is a penalty for misbehavior. The entire institution is kept scrupulously clean.
