- 8 Shamrock Canapes
- 4 tablespoons chopped green peppers
- 2 hard cooked eggs, diced
- 4 tablespoons chopped green olives
- 3 tablespoons mayonnaise
- Mix peppers, eggs, olives, and mayonnaise, and spread on hot shamrocks of toast. Arrange on serving dishes. Serve at once.
- Sweet Potato Balls
- 2 cups hot mashed sweet potatoes
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1-3 cup flour
- 4 tablespoons fat, melted
- Mix potatoes, salt, paprika, and butter. Shape into eight balls and roll in flour. Melt fat in frying pan. When hot add potatoes. Coat well with hot, melted fat. Bake 10 minutes in moderate oven.

- Green Fruit Shamrocks
- 1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture
- 2 cups boiling water
- Green fruit coloring
- 1 cup seeded white cherries
- 1 cup diced canned pears
- 1 cup seeded white grapes
- Pour water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved. Add fruit coloring until good light green color is obtained. Cool. Add rest of ingredients. Pour to thickness of one inch in shallow pan rinsed out of cold water. Set in cold place to stiffen. Unmold carefully and cut into shamrock shapes, using paper pattern or cookie cutter. Arrange on lettuce and surround with mayonnaise. Serve at once. These are very effective salads, and good tasting.

- St. Patrick's Dessert
- 8 slices white cake, cut in shamrock designs
- 1 quart vanilla ice cream
- 1 quart orange sherbet
- 1 cup green candy gum drops
- 1/2 cup whipped cream
- Arrange cake on green glass plates, top with portions of rest of ingredients. Insert tiny green silk flags and serve at once.

### NEW YORK TO FORCE ISSUE IN GORDON CASE

#### Governor Roosevelt Issues Ultimatum to Police Department

NEW YORK, March 6 (AP)—The state of New York today forced the issue in the Gordon case by ordering the police department to file a report on the alleged blackmail racket.

Governor Roosevelt, taking a hard line for the first time since he became the state's chief executive, ordered the police department to file a report on the alleged blackmail racket.

A group of citizens, led by such prominent men as Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, The Rev. John Haynes Holmes, E. Stanley Crawford, Major General James G. Harbord, John W. Davis, Dr. John H. Finley and others, began a movement for a general investigation of corruption in the greater city of New York.

A warning that the city facts a rule by gangsters unless business men unite to stop it was given the New York State Chamber of Commerce yesterday by George E. Washington, member of the city commission on crime prevention.

Introduction of a bill in the legislature by State Senator Seabury C. Mastick naming the commission of nine leading citizens to conduct an investigation was given a mixed reception today. Some viewed it as a political move, although the general reception was to term it "a step in the right direction."

Meanwhile testimony that Vivian Gordon's alleged blackmail racket had victimized officials of the federal government, here from Washington for week end parties, was reported to have been given the grand jury by John Whelan, bellhop in the Vanderbilt hotel.

One of the most profitable rackets which Miss Gordon was said to have run was that of supplying girls for rich men's parties. The bellhop was said to have "steered" many guests at the hotel to her when they approached him.

### GUIDING YOUR CHILD

#### EATING UTENSILS

Having forgotten our own early struggles with cup and spoon and fork, we are apt to be insufficiently appreciative of the child's first attempts to feed himself, and to give little thought to the eating utensils which to him are so important.

The proper development of independence in eating requires, among other things, that the child should have suitable utensils.

Until he is three, a bowl with other steeply sloping sides is much easier for him to get his food from than a flat plate where, even with the help of a cracker or piece of toast to push with, his food is apt to elude his most concentrated efforts.

The bowl has another advantage in that the child eats a rather more slowly than the adult, and the bowl keeps his food pleasantly warm much longer than does a plate.

The best sort of spoon for the child to handle is an ordinary teaspoon with a handle long enough to be grasped firmly in his fist.

A little child's drinking cup should not be overly large, so that when full it will not be too heavy for him

to lift, balance and tilt with his two hands. A mug which holds about six ounces, with straight sides and a good broad handle about which he can easily curve his fingers, is the best.

At two and a half or three, the child can begin using a fork. The adult size is awkward and heavy, and until he is about five he should use the small blunt fork especially designed for the use of children.

Above all, remember that the child is learning a new art, and one which comes with difficulty to a child's tiny hands.

When inclined to be impatient with his awkward motions, try using your own left hand for all the operations usually performed with your right. You will gain some conception of the difficulties which the child is mastering.
