Spell-Binding Orator Leads Soviet Army; Troops Learn Manners Along With Drills

By VICTOR EUBANK MOSCOW, March 9. (AP)—Communist ideals and the socialistic theories of Marx and Lenin are supposed to keep Russia's millions working together in the spirit of brotherly love. But the backstop of it all is the "Oppu," or secret political police, and the Red army of 650,000 conscripts.

He's a Spell-Binder Speechmaking forms a large part of an army general's job in Russia. The commissar of war must be able to talk to his men and the public at large, and be convincing. Voroshilov is all of that.

Every conscript from the steppes, mostly illiterate, now emerges from his three years in the army thoroughly versed in "reading," "writing" and "rhythmic." He also learns to keep clean and observe other niceties of which he never heard before.

But Voroshilov doesn't spend all his time teaching the use of the gun and bayonet. He has inaugurated a system of education in the army.

Like many another soviet leader, the war department head was born to poverty and childhood toil. He couldn't read until he was 12, but a few years later he was absorbing Russian classics.

When the "February revolution" came along Voroshilov began to display his military talents. By the time the White Russians had laid siege to Tsaritzin, "the Red Verdun," his ability had been recognized, and it was there, too, that he met Stalin.

But in soviet politics, as in other countries, there is a "live and let live" policy. Consequently everybody is "a good friend" to everybody else and Voroshilov is sitting firmly in his saddle.
