Grave Solves Old Mystery

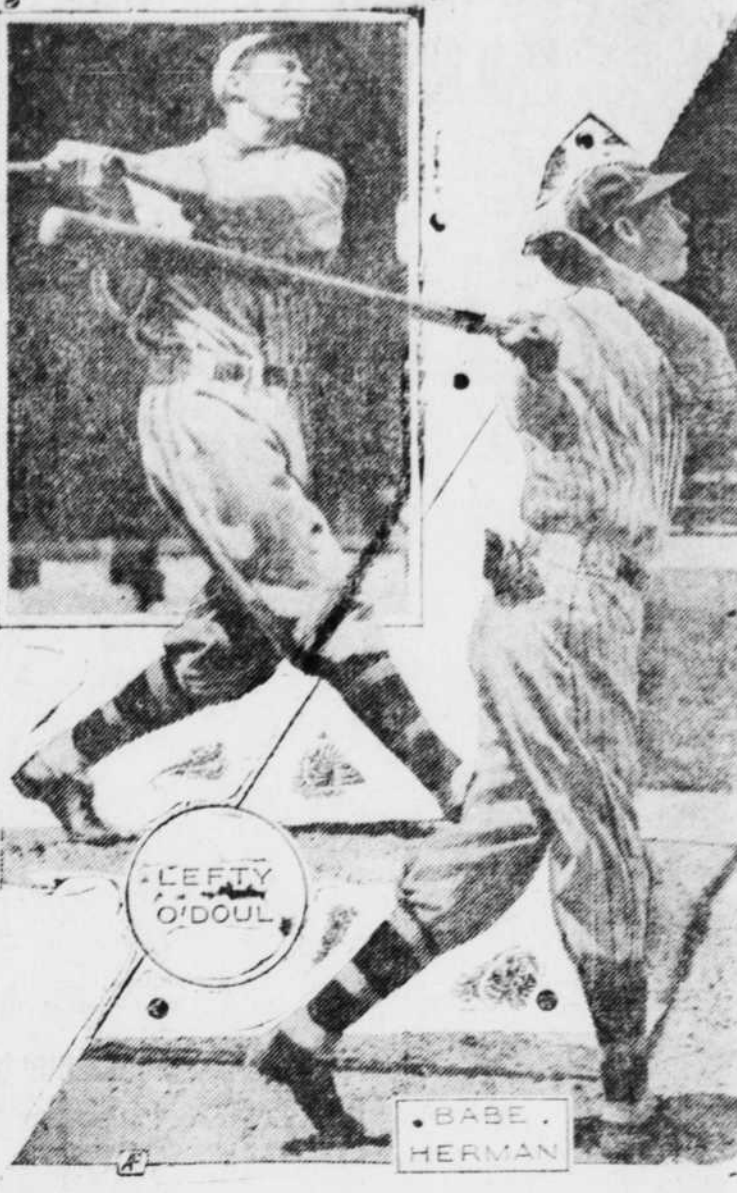
SAN BERNARDINO, March 13 (AP)—The long forgotten mystery of the disappearance of Don Allen, a mining prospector, was believed solved today when bones were found beneath a pile of stumps in Big Bear valley.

The grave was discovered by Thomas Stocker, Ten years ago Allen located a claim in the mountains. In 1921 he disappeared. Two notes, one telling of warnings to Allen to stay away from a claim and another detailing Allen's death were found.

Stocker discovered the bones and a shotgun shell in which the messages were wadded. Ten feet away was a stone on which was written Don Allen. Authorities were attempting to learn if the bones were those of a human and to be sure the affair was not a hoax before hunting for the signer of the notes.

CLEARWATER, Fla., March 11 (AP)—A battle for the batting supremacy of the National League which started in 1929, already has been renewed here by Frank "Lefty" O'Doul and Floyd "Babe" Herman.

LOUGHRAN OUTPOINTED ERN SCHAAF

NEW YORK, March 13 (AP)—Tommy Loughran, veteran Philadelphia slugger, scored a ten round decision over Ernie Schaaf, young Boston heavyweight, here tonight.

Loughran gave away more than 17 pounds to his opponent. The weights were Loughran 182 1/2, Schaaf 200. The decision of the two judges and Referee Gahn was unanimous.

The decision was greeted with great enthusiasm by the crowd of 12,000 which constituted one of the largest boxing assemblies at Madison Square Garden within recent months.

Loughran's boxing ability was the outstanding reason for his victory. He boasts one of the prettiest left jabs of any active American boxer and this blow landed in the Bostonian's face with decided frequency.
