CATTLE THEFT LAW PLANNED

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 13 (U.P.)—The Oklahoma legislature has been asked to enact a law intended to curb the activities of modern cattle thieves.
 The bill provides that all persons buying cattle for slaughter must register with a complete description of all animals they purchase for slaughtering. Names of the persons from whom the animals are bought would be furnished public officials.
 Keeping of such a record will enable officials to trace disposition of stolen animals and eventually result in the arrest of guilty persons, proponents of the measure claim.
 Cattle thieves have become so active in some sections of the state recently that lawmakers decided to urge the legislature to take some action. Introduction of the bill followed.
 It was necessary to organize a vigilance committee recently in southeastern Oklahoma to curb the thefts.

NOTICE OF SALE OF LAS VEGAS HIGHWAY BONDS (1931 Series)

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Commissioners of the City of Las Vegas, Clark County, Nevada, will receive bids until 3 o'clock P. M. on the 8th day of April, 1931, for the purchase of Ten (10) bonds of the Las Vegas Highway Bonds (1931 Series). Said bonds consist of ten (10) bonds in the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) each, of which two (2) bonds of the denomination of one thousand dollars each will be payable in five annual installments commencing on the 2nd day of January 1932. Said bonds will bear interest at a rate not exceeding six per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, and will bear date January 1, 1931. The principal of each of said bonds is payable on or before its due date. Interest on each of said bonds shall cease on the date when the bond becomes due and is payable or is paid, and in settling each of said bonds the interest shall be payable only to the date of the retirement of said bonds respectively.

New Planet Is Given Attention

PASADENA, Calif., March 13 (U.P.)—It is quite possible that the new planet, Ba, discovered by Professor Lachino, may be another of the group of asteroids, which contain more than a thousand such planets, Dr. S. B. Nicholson of Mount Wilson Observatory stated to the United Press today when in Pasadena on the latest astral discovery.
 "We can give no definite details regarding this latest discovery," he said, "until we have studied the matter. We expect to do within the next two or three days."
 "We are just receiving a cablegram now of the Planet's location and motion and from the information we receive will study its motion to ascertain what type of planet it is.
 It is quite possible however, that Ba may be another planet similar to Pluto. This depends, however, on the measurements of the planet's motion."
 Dr. Nicholson said that Lachino was the discoverer of many of the planets in the asteroid group and that it might be possible that he had discovered other unknown members of the body.

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YOUR BRAIN and YOUR HEALTH

By DR. LELAND B. ALFORD, MEDICAL MISSIONARY
 A medical missionary, Dr. R. M. Wilson, has written much of observation during 23 years practice in Korea. It is the most significant article for western civilization that I have read in a long time.
 Life is hard for the native in that primitive country, but a large proportion of the inhabitants of the western world would gladly change places with them if it were possible.
 Gout is practically unknown there, the reason being, doubtless, that seaweed and other sea foods are common articles of diet. Rickets does not occur, the natives having fine straight limbs and proportioned chests. Abundance of exposure to sunlight, probably explains these.
 Cancer seems to be rare and pernicious anemia is not seen. Blood pressure is usually low. What a lot of our misery they are spared!
 Dentists from America are astounded at the beautiful white, almost perfect teeth. There is little need for dentists there. Diet, probably is the secret.
 There is not a mental hospital in Korea. The country is spared the enormous burden of expense and misery which is ours. There is no mad rush or excitement, people are calm and take things as a matter of course.
 The native is the original red-blooded he-man. He shoulders a 200 pound bag of salt and trots 25 miles a day through the mountains. His food costs him two cents a meal. It consists largely of rice and a pickled turnip, the latter resembling sauerkraut. Practically no milk, meat or fruit are in their diet.
 It is a case of survival of the fittest with infants. They receive little care and the mortality is very high. But those who live have good constitutions which they transmit to offspring.

Fails To Appear, Bond Forfeited
