Governor Expected to Sign Both Bills Today

CARSON CITY, Nev., March 18 (U.P)—A proposal to allow wide open gambling in Nevada, adopted almost unanimously by the state legislature was sent to Governor Fred B. Balzar, for signature tonight.

Balzar also had before him the bill that would permit granting of divorces in this state after complainant had resided here six

He was expected to sign both bills and thereby complete Nevada's campaign to hold attention of the wealthy divorce seeker who might have been lured to Arkansas and Idaho since those two states re-cently reduced the residence requirements to three months.

The state assembly this afternoon approved senate amendments to the gambling bill.





Iowa Brothers Set New World's Record in Ford

OWA state officials and civic leaders witnessed the establishment of a new world's non-motor, nonwheel stop automobile endurance record recently, when Ralph and Rolland Davis, brothers, brought their Model A Ford to a halt at the east entrance of the state capitol in Des Moines after 2,775 hours and 46 minutes of continuous driving.

When Governor Hammill, standing with Walter Ferrell of the American Automobile Association, gave the signal to stop, the Ford had traveled a total of 47,138.3 miles over all sorts of roads in all sorts of weather and had exceeded by 33,680 miles and more

than 2.335 hours the American non-stop endurance record which, theretofore officially recognized, was made by a much heavier car under almost ideal conditions on the Indianapolis speedway. In the course of the endurance run, the car, known as "The City of Des Moines," coverel practically the entire state of Iowa.

Engineers who examined the Ford at the conclusion of the run asserted that neither engine nor chassis showed evidence of the gruelling strains to which they were subjected during the 116 days of continuous driving. Both apparently, according to the engineers, would have been good for another 50,000 miles or more.


