Lester Perry, father of H. L. and Verne Perry, is here from California for a visit.

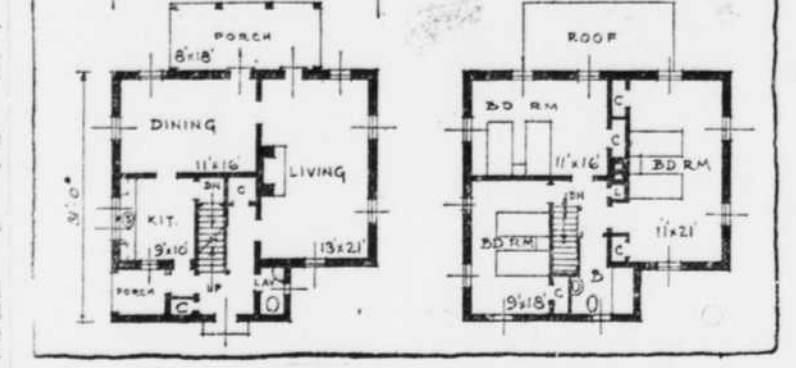

ECONOMY RESULTS FROM THIS WISE PLAN OF ENGLISH HOME



Behind an exterior typical of the English country home of moderate size is here found a room arrangement linking comfort and economy. Construction costs are reduced by a plan that has eliminated lost space and has, for example, placed main partitions one over the other. In this convenience has not been sacrificed.

The exterior walls are of two shades of brick slightly different in color. A suggested combination is a dark purple-red brick for the quoins and bands with orange-red for the panels so formed. Avoid too great a contrast. The roof is of slate in dark blue-gray in tones varied to prevent monotony. The trim of doors and windows is white and shutters are painted a green that is not too dark.

Downstairs the convenience of the front entry arrangement is obvious. The kitchen is near the stairs and within a few steps either of the front door or of the small porch forming a side entry behind the wall shown in the picture. The lavatory is conveniently located.

Three bedrooms and a bath comprise the second floor layout and each room has a clothes closet.

Today being Maundy Thursday, there will be a special service of Holy Eucharist at Christ Episcopal church at 9:30 a. m. with a short meditation by the vicar.

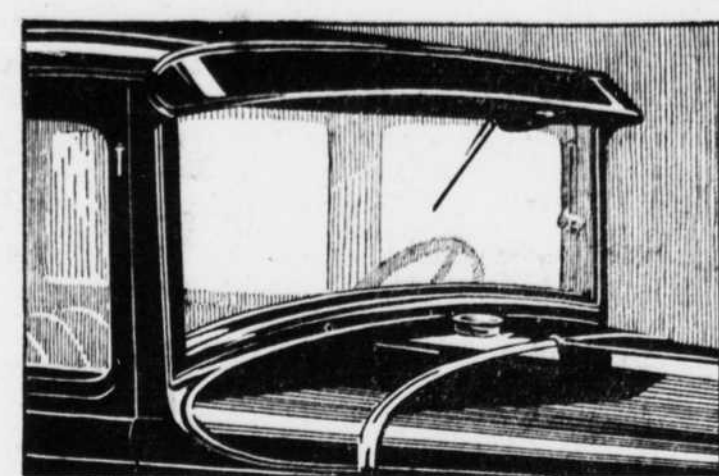

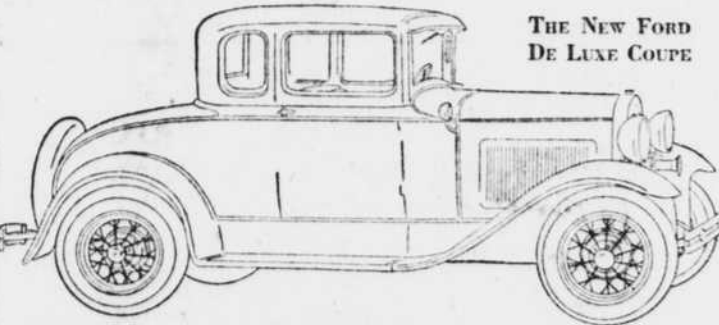
