### SIX COMPANIES REFUSE CALIFORNIA REQUEST ON EMPLOYMENT OF LABOR

Company Official States That All Hoover Dam Labor Will Be Hired Through Labor Commissioner at Las Vegas

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1 (AP)—Replying to an inquiry from the California department of industrial relations, officials of Six Companies, Inc., authorized builders of Hoover dam, announced that all construction labor would be employed through the office of the labor commissioner at Las Vegas.

The California department had requested that the Hoover dam labor be employed through the California free employment agencies, but the Six Companies officials questioned the right of the California department to establish an agency for the employment of men for work outside the state and said it would arouse resentment in Nevada and Arizona.

### Attorney Dies In Plane Crash

PALM SPRINGS, Cal. April 1 (AP)—One man was killed and another parachuted safely to earth when the tiny plane in which they were flying from Los Angeles to Chicago was caught by a gust of wind over San Geronimo Pass and thrown out of control.

Harry C. Miller, attorney for the Transpacific Corporation, a bank holding company, was killed when he attempted to land the ship. He jumped too late and his parachute became entangled in the plane. He was crushed by the engine.

Richard F. Hardin, his companion was the passenger. Hardin was said to be the designer of the midget plane, manufactured by a Los Angeles company.

### New Fees Adopted By Clerk's Office

The new schedule of fees passed by the legislature went into effect in the office of County Clerk William L. Scott yesterday morning. For the most part there are no big increases, but provision has been made for fees in many cases where they had not been provided for formerly. It is expected that the new schedule will mean an increase of at least \$2,500 per year in this office.

The biggest increases were the raise from \$15.00 to \$20.00 for the filing of civil cases, and the increase from \$2.00 to \$5.00 for the filing of any first paper by a defendant.

That business has been on the upgrade is shown by the records of the clerk's office for the month of March. There was an increase of \$300 in fees, 35 cases filed and 62 marriage licenses issued.

Prior to his return to Las Vegas to join the firm of Stevens & Henderson, he was engaged in the law practice in Los Angeles.
