NEW YORK, March 30. (AP)—Julia Sanderson and Frank Crumit, sweethearts of the stage, are now married folks of the air.

They had retired from the entertainment world, going to their cottage near Springfield, Mass., when radio beckoned.

Now they go on the air three times a week, singing solos and duets. Frank strums his ukulele, selecting tunes of yesteryear as well as more modern numbers. That means they must be long distance commuters to New York each week.

They are happily married, studio attendants are sure, for they sing their duets from a single microphone, arms around each other.

Julia weighs 126 pounds, has medium blond hair and a soft complexion.

Frank is six feet tall and weighs 209 pounds. Plenty of golf keeps him in trim condition.

Crumit, a graduate of the University of Ohio, began his stage career in 1912. In '25 he entered musical comedy in "Queen of the Movies." Show followed show.

Miss Sanderson, a native of Springfield, Mass., first tried the stage at 13, later entered the chorus in New York and advanced quickly to leading roles.

While playing in "Tangerine" she met Crumit. He became her leading man in "No, No, Nanette," "Queen High" and "Oh Kay."

PARIS. (AP)—The jacket ensemble is "the last word" in chic for both sunlight and moonlight styles. Jackets long or short, fitted or straight, matching or contrasting with the frock in color, will be worn by smart women this spring for every occasion from sports to balls.

The smartest ensembles for the first warm days combine plaids, prints and checks with plain colors. A navy blue and white pin-checked taffeta frock is accompanied by a waist length blue jacket. Beige and brown coin dot dresses have sleeveless blouses of heavy brown crepe de chine, and an ensemble with a black crepe skirt and pink and black figured blouse is finished with a three-quarter coat of matching black crepe.

Cool days will find trim fur jacket ensembles a favorite in the fashion parade. A brown and white shadow plaid wool frock with a pleated skirt is worn with a sleeveless Eton and flat brown caracul, while a hiplength jacket of caramel pny skin accompanies a dark brown wool dress.

The combination of white jackets with black skirts or frocks is one of the smartest in the mode. White galyak jackets with black galyak collar and cuffs are worn with black broadcloth skirts, while waistlength jackets of white satin or angel's skin (silk broadcloth) are a fashionable finish for both black afternoon and evening frocks.

The sports mode displays num-

berless jackets. Brown wool skirts are worn with brown and white plaid jackets, leaf green jersey frocks flecked with dark green scarves and cardigans of the same shade of dark green and dark blue, gray and scarlet mottled wool dresses are finished with red or dark blue jackets.
