War Declared By Portuguese In Madeira

MADRID, Spain, April 6. (AP)—The Portuguese government today decreed a state of war in Madeira and the Azores islands, reliable dispatches from Lisbon said. War supplies, including artillery and four hydroplanes, are being shipped to Funchal, capital of Madeira, held by rebel forces since the coup there over the week-end. A new high commissioner, Fernando Borges, accompanied by a force of 1,000 men, will sail for Funchal on the Pedro Gomez tomorrow, the reports said.

SEARCHLIGHT'S NEW MILL NOW IN OPERATION

Hundred Ton Production Is Expected by May First... Searchlight, famous old gold camp of Nevada, will once more see the hustle and bustle that once made Nevada famous. The old Duplex that once made it famous is again turning out a milling grade ore. The new mill erected by the Searchlight Gold corporation is running at about 70 per cent capacity, increasing in production every week. At the present time the mill has produced approximately 40 tons of concentrates that assay on an average of \$450. The concentrates will be shipped within the coming week to the smelter in Salt Lake City.

County Board to Suspend Payment Of County Claims

Payment of claims against the county was stopped suddenly yesterday at the regular meeting of the board of county commissioners, when the board was informed by County Treasurer J. M. Ullom that there was a shortage in the general and indentured funds amounting to approximately \$6,100. Money already collected on the June installment of taxes was ordered apportioned, as far as possible, but it was found that there was still a shortage of some \$3,700.
