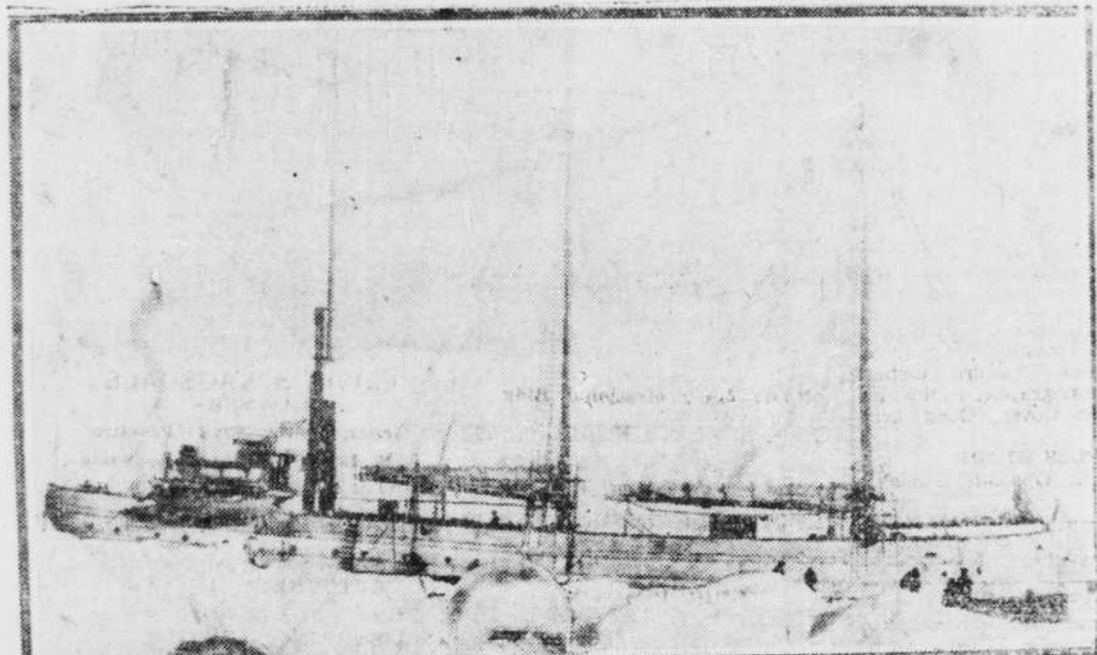

FACES ICE FLOES AND HIJACKERS



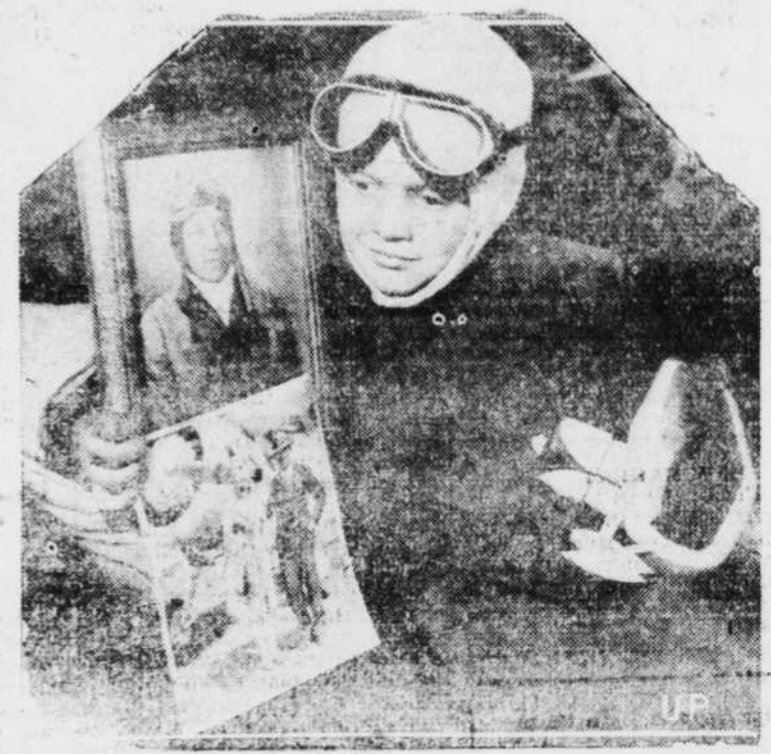
Capt. C. E. Pederson and his wife, shown at the left, are preparing to sail June 1 from San Francisco on their yearly trip to Herschell Island, just off the Arctic coast of Canada, where they spend the summer trading for furs and ivory. Their ship, the Fatterson, is shown above, anchored off the ice-bound coast. Capt. Pederson is said to know more about the movements of the ice floes than any man alive, and is the first man to enter the region each year. The cargoes he returns with often run as high as \$1,000,000 in value, and he is forced to keep a lookout for hijackers, who threaten to attack him on the return trip. The trip takes 21 days each way, and a total of 12,000 miles is covered.

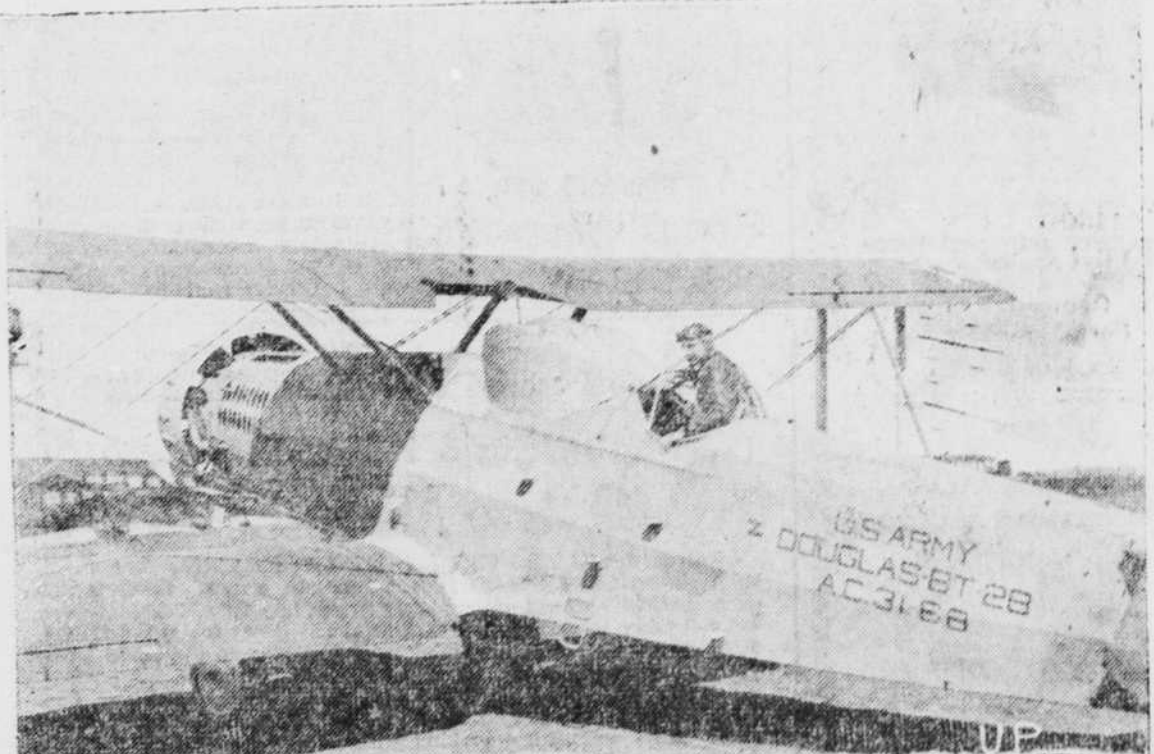
