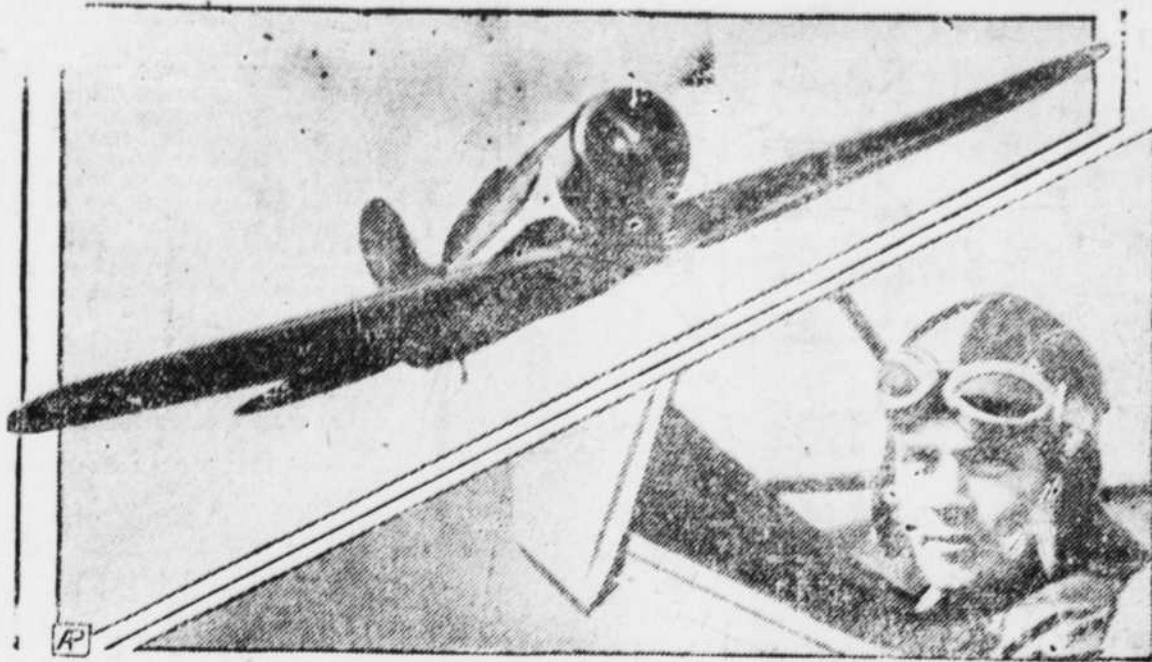

LINDBERGH'S PLANE SPEEDED UP; COULD FLY ACROSS U. S. IN 10 HOURS

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) — Col. Charles A. Lindbergh soon will need a new air speed indicator in his swift roadster of the sky, the Lockheed-Spirit monoplane in which he flew from Los Angeles to New York in 14 hours and 25 minutes a year ago.

In the factory here a new wing awaits the colonel's arrival. With it, engineers estimate, he will be able to fly at a speed of 240 miles an hour.

The wing embodies a retractable landing gear, one of the interesting aviation developments of the year. The idea for it sprang from a casual remark made by the blond aviator when he was on the Pacific coast last spring.

A few days after he had taken delivery of the low-wing monoplane he sat in the engineer's office talking about it and the conversation drifted to landing gear, which is not retractable on his two-place ship.

"Why don't you build a retractable landing gear?" Lindbergh asked.

Capt. Carl Squier, engineer of the firm, considered it an order and promised to comply.

A wing with the retractable gear was produced. By folding the wheels in the wing the greatest single point of resistance in flight was elimi-

nated. More than 400 tests of the new wing have shown that it increases air speed about 20 miles an hour.

During these tests Colonel Lindbergh installed a 629-horsepower motor in his ship to replace one of 425 horsepower. The combination of increased power and streamlined wing is expected to give the Lindbergh ship a speed of four miles a minute.

Col. Lindbergh has not said what flights he plans for the ship, which would be the fastest long-distance plane in the United States.

If it proved up to estimates and weather conditions were favorable, he could fly from Los Angeles to New York in 10 hours as compared to the trans-continental record made by Capt. Frank Hadwa when he spanned the continent in 12 hours, 25 minutes.

Through a rearrangement of gasoline tanks the fuel capacity of Lindbergh's plane, 440 gallons, will not be lessened by the space lost in the wing to retract the landing gear.

Colonel Lindbergh once said New York and Los Angeles might no be more than 10 hours apart. He may prove it this summer.

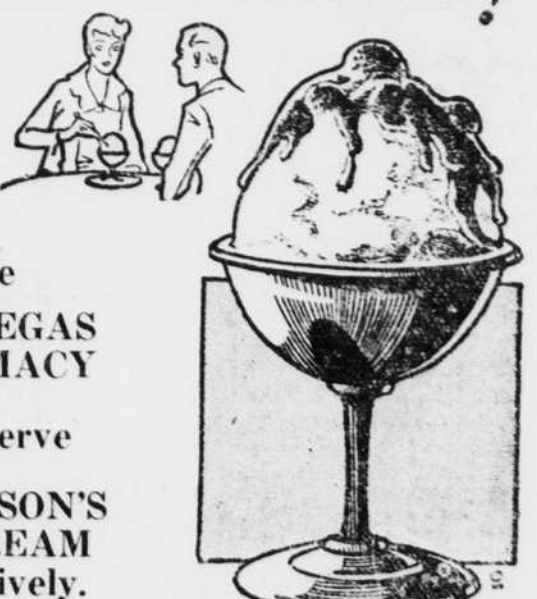

LEGION CARD FOR FRIDAY A GOOD ONE

Noted Bantam Will Meet Thomas in Main Event

Bud Thomas, sensational Las Vegas bantamweight boxer, will meet Delos Kid Williams of New Orleans in the ten round main event at the Legion stadium Friday night.

Thomas, one of the best punchers in the bantam class, will be given his opportunity to challenge the world's greatest bantamweights if he can defeat the veteran Williams. Williams, who has traded punches with La Barba, Newsboy Brown, Speedy Dado, Kid Francis, Claude Varner and other leaders of his division, rules a ten to eight favorite over Thomas. But many Vegas fans who have seen Bud have six opponents in the Legion stadium, will back Thomas to win from Williams.

Matchmaker George Burns has four preliminary bouts that promise to furnish many thrills to the fans: Merwin Hunting and Luis Santa Cruz, local lightweights, will meet in the 4-round semi-final. The last time these boys boxed a great draw, with both fighters, thinking they should have had the division.

Stonewall Jackson will box Tex Garner in a grudge battle in the special event.

Kid Miller, Vegas boy, will make the first fight on his return to the ring, trading punches with Whitey French, former leading middleweight of the army.

Young Jack, a Vegas youngster who looks like a real pugilistic prospect, will open the show, boxing Kid Chavez, another Vegas boy.

Promoter Burns offers as an added attraction, Frankie Leavitt, one of the most sensational wrestlers in the west, and Rough House Johnny Marrs, in a one fall wrestling match with a one hour time limit.

Leavitt, a 200 pound mass of muscle, is heavyweight champion of the Pacific Northwest and is one of the greatest leg wrestlers in the business. Rough House Marrs of St. Louis says he will throw Leavitt long before the one hour time limit.

The boxers are all training at the Legion stadium every evening at 5 p. m. The public is cordially invited to watch them in their training.
