Parole Reforms & Increased Guards Follow Disastrous Prison Outbreaks

NEW YORK (AP)—A new technique in prison administration may grow out of the outbreaks which were written in flame and blood into the pages of contemporary history.

As a result of inquiries into disorders, which have claimed 35 lives within 24 months—excluding the 320 victims of the Ohio prison holocaust—there have been reverberations in legislatures and shake-ups among prison officials.

Investigating fingers have poked into the sore spots revealed by the riots and mutinies, with the result that action is being taken in several states to seek permanent remedies.

On one hand, such measures as increases in guard forces and armaments are being applied, while on the other, there is an effort to ferret out these irritants which spur convicts to an unreckoning fury.

Since July 22, 1929, when three were killed in the Clinton prison mutiny at Dannemora, N. Y., there have been nine major outbreaks divided among prisons at Auburn, N. Y., Jefferson City, Mo., Leavenworth, Kans., Canon City, Colo., Howard R. I., and Joliet, Ill.

Here are some of the developments following them:

NEW YORK Precautionary measures taken by the New York department of correction following the 1929 riots at Auburn and Dannemora prisons in which 13 were killed include increased armament and gas bombs for all four state prisons.

All guards are now required to attend an "efficiency" school. Attention has been paid to improved quarters, better food and increased shop facilities.

After the riots it was disclosed that 170 principals in the Auburn riots had for more than a year been kept in cells with only a few minutes' daily intervals of exercise under supervision of the guards.

With the completion of new shops replacing those burned by the riot, at Auburn and Dannemora, many have been put to work and allowed to mingle with their fellows.

Another factor contributing to better morale is the expected enactment of pending legislation to restore the system of compensation, in effect prior to 1926, whereby a prisoner's good behavior would earn time off.

COLORADO Reverberations of the 1929 Colorado prison mutiny in which 13 were killed and much damage done were echoed in the state's gubernatorial campaign and punctuated the 1931 session of the state general assembly.

Gov. William H. Adams has approved the pending legislation based on the report of the special investigating committee he named following the outbreak.

The committee recommended that one-man cells replace two-men cells in new buildings, that additional employment be provided for convicts within the walls, and that a large prison farm be purchased to supplement the five ranches operated by the prison.

In addition, it was recommended that prisoners be given increased allowances for meritorious conduct, that first-termers be segregated from hardened criminals, that convicts be used on highway construction, and that guards, now paid a minimum of \$85 monthly, receive pay increases.

Girl Students Test Theories On Poor Sleep

HAMILTON, N. Y. April 15. (AP)—One hundred and thirty-six girls at Skidmore college have been taking sleeping tests, and one makes a perfect score.

This one breaks some of the most popular sleeping rules. She eats within an hour of retiring. She eats more sweets than 90 per cent of the girls. She is frightened and concerned about "affairs of the heart," and she is not physically tired upon going to bed.

But she has also one trait which these experiments indicate is particularly conducive to good sleep. This is a habit of looking forward to the next day with pleasure.

The experiments are conducted by Charles Morell of the Colgate university psychological laboratory under direction of Dr. Donald A. Laird. The young women are students in classes of Dr. Linus W. Kline of Skidmore.

The habit of looking forward with pleasure to the next day characterizes large groups of girls with average good sleep. Merely anticipating "just another day" likewise goes with good sleep. But anticipating the next day with displeasure seems to interfere with sleep.

Eleven per cent of the girls have this blue attitude. Many of this group have to be called more than once in the morning. It is suggested that the overpowering desire for just 40 winks more may be a mechanism shielding the sleeper's consciousness from anticipated unpleasantness.

The experiments indicate, Mr. Morell says, that hot baths and physical exercise may not be the aids to sleep that they have been considered. The baths seem to help only slightly. Physical exercise shortly before retiring retards getting to sleep. So also do serious thinking or planning at a similar hour.

Bamberger Boy Is "Real Bamberger; Mixed-Up Babies in Doubt No More

CHICAGO, April 15. (AP)—Blood will tell, as two families have found eight months after the Watkins-Bamberger baby mix-up was a national sensation.

And the Solomon decision of Dr. Arnold Kegeel, young Chicago health commissioner, ranks as somewhat of a twentieth century duplication of the sagacity of the ancient king of the Jews.

Both families, the William Watkins and the Charles Bambergers, are satisfied the children are theirs, said Dr. Kegeel. The Bamberger boy has taken on the facial and stature aspects of two other children, three and five years old, and of the parents. The Watkins no longer live in Chicago.

The Watkins-Bamberger "mix-up" began last June when boys were born in the same hospital on the same night to Mrs. Watkins and Mrs. Bamberger.
