INSISTS UPON
USE OF COLOR**

PARIS (AP)—The color combinations milady wears this spring will make or mar her smartness. Brown and yellow, green and crimson, grey and sapphire—these are the tints which brighten a mode devoted to unusual color combinations instead of striking silhouettes. The monotone color scheme has been tossed into the discard, for a combination which contrasts coats and frocks, blouses and skirts or dresses and accessories.

Brown coats are worn with brick-red or leaf green frocks, brown hats, gloves and belts. Brown suits are finished with lemon yellow, leaf green, or beige and copper striped blouses and chocolate hued accessories.

The woman whose suit is navy blue may choose white accessories, or a blouse of lemon yellow, while the debutante with a new dark blue wool coat may wear a pastel blue or maize yellow frock with hat and shoes of dark blue. Geranium red combined with pearl grey is another favorite combination for navy. Light green ensembles are worn

with dark green chapeaux and accessories, while leaf green frocks may be worn with black or wood brown coats, hats and bags.

Dark or black accessories are generally used on light gowns or ensembles, while livid touches are used as a contrast for black.

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NEW YORK (AP)—Black navy blue and brown kid pumps and oxfords are being extensively worn this spring to accent light ensembles, as well as to emphasize the outstanding colors in prints.

Of especial interest are dark kid shoes touched off with white kid the extremely modish black and white streets costume—white dress with dark jacket, or the other way around.

Carefully matched ensembles are no longer smart; dark or bright accessories are worn with costumes in light and neutral shades this spring, and many new color combinations have appeared.

Black, navy blue and brown harmonize with a number of costumes. They may be worn with matching coats over pastel frocks, or to accent gray or beige ensembles. The two-tone effect, as exemplified in perforated kid slippers with a contrasting underlay, are decidedly popular.

In shoes of solid color, which this year show a greater tailored influence, interest is heightened by emphasis upon detail and workmanship in the form of perforations and decorative stitching.

Low-cut kid oxfords or pumps of this description go exceedingly well with all types of "between season" costumes—lightweight wools, printed silks and shantung.

Shoes for this time of the year are lightweight and delicate, as befits the mood of the smart woman as she emerges from the austerity of winter.

In kid, due to the soft, resilient nature of the leather, this feeling is best expressed.

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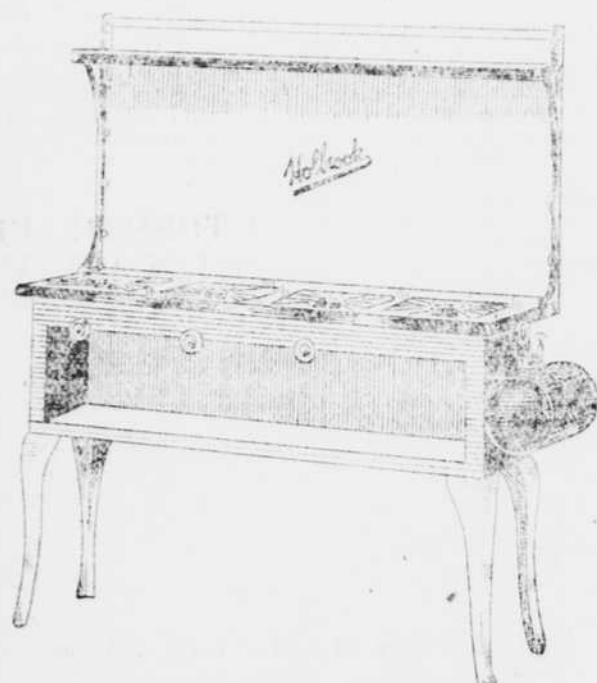
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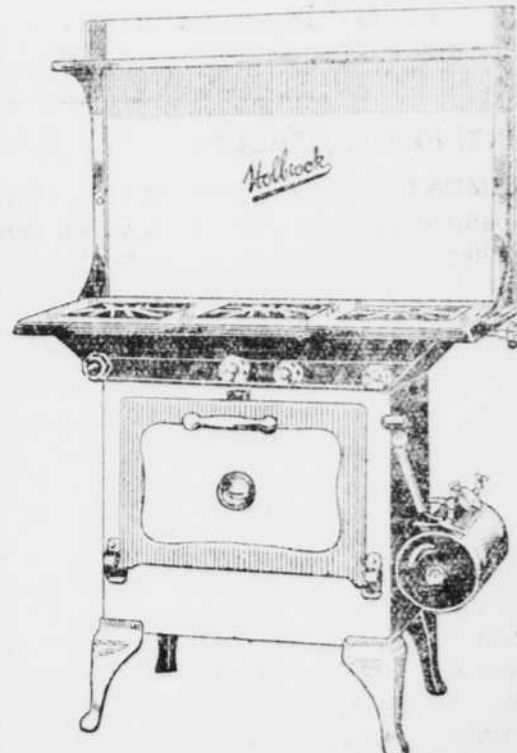
