HOLLYWOOD, April 27 (U.P.)—The modern girl is a product of the screen, declared Lucille Webber of Gleason, who has gained fame on the stage and in pictures.
"Women of villages see life on the screen and see it," she said. "Why not? We all want to get the most out of life. When pictures came into being, women did not go on bathing beaches without stockings, knee length skirts and corsets under the voluminous suits.
"When Mack Sennett's bathing beauties made semi-nudity a part of the village weekly program, soon the stockings were discarded as women everywhere secretly tried to look like the bathing beauties."
Mrs. Gleason pointed out that women always have been the most consistent patrons of motion picture

theaters. They make up the audience to such an extent that producers select stories which will appeal to the feminine goers. Women want novelty and change. Monotony of home life creates a demand for amusement and change. Keen producers have sensed this and feed on extremes in styles, manners and modes.
"Sex may have gone too far on the screen," Mrs. Gleason said, "but I do not think much good has been done in showing people over the world how men and women can live in proximity without false modesty and feigned shrinking. Men like the open, frank girl of today and she is far healthier and more companionable than the shrinking violet of twenty years ago. Liberty of speech and acting has come to womanhood through pictures, and it will never be taken away again."
