NOTICE OF SEWER BOND ELECTION

Notice is hereby given, that pursuant to a Resolution duly adopted by the Board of City Commissioners of the City of Las Vegas at a recessed regular meeting thereof on the 13th day of April, 1931, there will be submitted to the vote of the regularly qualified electors of said City of Las Vegas, at the general city election, to be held on Tuesday, the 5th day of May, 1931, the question as to whether or not there shall be issued by the City of Las Vegas One Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars of negotiable coupon bonds for the purpose of securing money to construct a sewerage system in said City (including a disposal plant) and waste main therefrom.

Gaid bonds, if authorized at said election, will be of the denomination of One Thousand Dollars each and bear interest at the rate fixed by the successful bidder, but not to exceed seven per centum per annum, the interest on each bond to be payable semi-annually, on the 2nd day of January and first day of July of each year. 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Direction Finder, "Detective Of Radio," To Be Used In Tracing Fake SOS Calls

NEW YORK, (AP)—Fake SOS calls are causing considerable worry to the key pounders of radio.

In an attempt to put a stop to spurious calls for help purporting to be from ships at sea the "detective of the air" will be put on the job.

This detective is the direction finder. It has the inherent ability of pointing the way from which a radio signal is coming, and with the use of two or more of them, the section in which a particular station is located can be spotted.

Most of the fake SOS calls are believed by radio men to be sent out by rum runners in hope that coast guard cutters can be lured on false rescue dashes while liquor ships slip in.

To aid in this campaign, a special direction finder is to be installed at the powerful coastal station of the Radio Marine corporation at Tuckerton, N. J.

According to Charles J. Pannill, vice president and general manager, it will be possible with this device to determine if an SOS is coming from a ship at sea or from some land station operated by rum runners. It will be used in connection with others already installed.

If it is established beyond question that a distress call is fictitious, a plan will be put into operation whereby it is hoped the transmitter of the spurious call can be located.

Not long ago rescue ships and coast guard boats were sent thirty miles off Barnegat by SOS calls which later were traced to New Jersey.

In explaining the use of direction finders in chasing down radio law breaker, Pannill said that any one of the finders now operated by the radio division of the department of commerce and the naval radio stations could not definitely establish whether a call close to shore is from the sea or a few miles inland.

But by taking cross bearings with several finders, it could be definitely established whether a call from the vicinity of New York, with its many bays and inlets, came from sea or shore and calculations made as to its point of origin. Installation of the finder at Tuckerton is expected to be a big factor in this work.

REACT UPON BROADCASTING. The spurious SOS calls, besides causing much unnecessary search, also react upon broadcasting. Whenever an SOS comes in, coast broadcast stations are required by law to sign off so as to eliminate possible interference.

The direction finder operates on the principle that a strong signal will be received when a loop aerial is so placed that its plane is pointing at a transmitter. If the plane of the loop lies at right angles to the transmitter, no signal is heard.

The position at which the signal drops out is more sharply defined than that for maximum intensity. Because of that fact this point usually is used in fixing direction.
