

L. A. MEN TAKE OVER FORD MINE

SPECIAL TO THE AGE

SAN ANDREAS, Cal., May 5.—Negotiations have been completed whereby F. A. Mansfield and J. B. Ferguson, Los Angeles real estate and mining men, have taken over and are operating the Ford mine, near the Calaveras Development company, a Nevada corporation, the operation of the Ford mine, near this town. Joseph E. King (veteran Mother Lode mining man) will continue as mine superintendent, with D. Brewster Boyden, Los Angeles mining engineer, as consulting engineer.

Messrs. Mansfield and Ferguson became identified with Mother Lode mining activities less than two months ago and have since been financing the development of the Golden Hill mine, three miles north of San Andreas. It is known that they are contemplating the acquisition of additional properties in Calaveras county.

It has only been within the last six months that the Ford mine has been reopened and its 750-foot incline shaft dewatered and retimbered. Recent operations have been attended by highly pleasing results, particularly on the 100-foot level, on which a drift south on the east vein is exposing two and a half feet of ore assaying \$70 a ton in gold, exclusive of specimen rock showing a liberal distribution of free gold visible to the naked eye. A winze on this showing below the draft has been started. Superintending King reports that the ore being extracted is maintaining its high average value and that the specimen rock is being found in greater quantity as sinking progresses.

German Lad Holds Up 'Mike' To U. S. So Berlin Can Study American 'Pep'

Broadcasting America

NEW YORK, (AP)—A German youth stepped off a trans-Atlantic liner not long ago with a microphone under his arm, bent on finding the noisiest spots typical to America.

Since then he has gone places and done things in a broadcasting way that few before him even thought of.

He climbed the long flight of stairs to the top of the Statue of Liberty in New York bay; he went to the dome of the nation's capital in Washington; he visited a department store; he went to the top of the Empire State building, tallest in the world.

He mingled with the crowds in Times Square, New York, and took his microphone into two scenes of night life activity—the dignified St. Regis hotel, where the Vincenz Lopez orchestra plays, and the Cotton club, where Cab Calloway presides as conductor.

His objective was to tell listeners in far-away Germany just how Americans acted amid the hurry and bustle of the business world, and what they did when they sought entertainment lasting far into the early morning hours.

The young man bears the title of Hellmut H. Hellmut, and radio columnists delight in referring to him as "Hectic Hellmut."

But, and here's a secret that few on this side of the Atlantic know, his real name is Hellmut Heinz Honig. He is the son of an official of a big German electric manufacturing company.

He is youthful as well as dynamic, for his age is only 21. Of a somewhat nervous type, he is never satisfied unless he is in action. Before the microphone he puts into the story he is relating in German a McNamee-like effect.

Hellmut has had the cooperation of the National Broadcasting company, which has been sending his Schenectady short wave station W2XAF for rebroadcasting there.

Under the guidance of William Burke Miller, director of special broadcasts of NBC, Hellmut, despite the effervescence he displays at all times, has had no untoward experiences in America, except possibly a run in or two with a traffic policeman.

ANGLER FEEDS HUNGRY FOLKS

LOS ANGELES, May 5. (AP)—Charles C. Cady, who last year caught 3700 pounds of mackerel, and predicts a two-ton catch this year, combines philanthropy with his sport.

Hundreds of hungry men and women have been fed by this sportsman, who gave all of his catch last year to charitable organizations among the poor.

While Cady was unable to serve the fish "on a silver platter" he did the next best thing and served them to the different charitable organizations in tubs. He salted the fish himself and bought the tubs, 180 in all, in which to pack them.

If his success keeps up, the average catch for this month will be 142 pounds, which incidentally will require an exceedingly large amount of salt. Last year Cady used 180 pounds for this purpose.

Captain J. Olsen, owner of the barge Fox hearing of Cady's philanthropy, has placed his barge at the disposal of the sportsman. That is why Cady is so optimistic over this year's catch. He expects to make at least 60 trips in the barge during the course of the year.

CHEESE SOUFFLE FOR DINNER

Cheese Souffle and Asparagus Tips
Baked Potatoes
Plum Jelly
Perfection Salad
Fruit Cookies
Coffee

Cheese Souffle and Asparagus Tips
6 tablespoons butter
6 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon celery salt
1 teaspoon chopped onions
1 2-3 cups milk
1 cup cheese, cut fine
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
4 egg yolks
4 egg whites, beaten
2 cups cooked asparagus

Melt butter and add flour, salt, paprika and celery salt. Add onions and milk. Cook until very thick sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add cheese, parsley and egg yolks. Beat into shallow, buttered baking pan. Set in pan of hot water and bake 35 minutes in moderate oven. Carefully cut into squares and remove to serving platter. Surround with asparagus.

Perfection Salad
1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture
2 cups boiling water
1 cup chopped cabbage
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
3 tablespoons chopped pimientos
1 cup salad dressing

WASHINGTON, May 4. (AP)—A middle-aged man who in youth aspired to be a bookkeeper is regarded as the leader of Honduras' latest revolt. Friends say it is his fifth revolution in Honduras.

General Gregorio Ferrera, despite his reputation of shooting surely from both hips, does not personify the sappy-book conception of the dashing soldier of fortune. Those who know him well say that he is "meek of manner with a reserve that closely approaches timidity. His almost frail physique is well under medium height.

His halting speech is infrequent and he rarely looks a person squarely in the eye. He is described as a crafty chieftain who never smokes, drinks intoxicating beverages, or gambles.

A quick, nervous movement on light feet suggests the full-blooded Indian that he is. His attire is usually neat and simple. A wide brim hat is just as much a part of his sartorial equipment as his polished

LIQUOR PROFITS NINE MILLIONS

LONDON, O., May 5. (AP)—Turkish Revenue from the sale of liquor, and liquor permits, gave the Ontario Provincial government a total profit of \$9,315,967.30 last year, according to the Ontario Liquor Control Board's annual report.

The Board paid \$15,500,000 to the federal government as customs duties, excise duties, malt duties, beer gallonage, and sales tax.

Of the 1,323 permit cancellations, 499 were for over-indulgence, the report stated.

CRIPPLED FOX BATTLEFIELD, Va., May 5. (AP)—

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MAY COLLAPSE



The massive brick City Hall at Woodland, Cal., which, incidentally, will not be fully paid for until 1939, is in danger of falling down, according to a report recently made to the City Council by an expert building inspector. The slightest earth shock, according to the inspector, will send the heavy roof crashing to the basement and the wobbly brick walls will crumple like paper. He recommended that the building be vacated immediately. Solution to the problem falls upon a new body of councilmen, recently elected upon a platform of rigid economy.

DECLINE SEEN IN BABY CHICKS

Since a marked decline has occurred in the number of baby chicks being bought by poultry raisers in the country, and particularly in the far west, this spring, Nevada poultrymen should, according to V. E. Scott, economist of the Nevada agricultural extension service, purchase their normal number of the chicks.

"It would be unwise," the economist states, "for Nevada poultrymen to purchase chicks after May 15, because they will not come into production early enough to realize on the fall market, and will only help to increase surpluses in the spring of 1932."

In farm flocks, the U. S. division of crop estimates reports a smaller number of hens and lower production per hen. With farm flocks making up a large percentage of the total egg production, the tendency to feed less and thus produce fewer eggs will, Scott believes, have a marked effect on the number of eggs delivered this summer.

RULED
LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 5. (AP)—Girls' basketball played under boys' rules may be "taboo" in this state in the near future. The Kentucky High School Athletic association was asked to abolish such play at the next state tournament by the Kentucky Education Association, which went on record as being opposed to the practice following the annual convention here. The association termed the game injurious.

Famed Poet Disliked Vampires He Declared In Faded Letter

BUIE, Mont., May 4. (AP)—If the literary world is unaware of the fact—George Noel Gordon Byron, immortal English poet, disliked vampires.

This was revealed here when Harry B. Henderson, holder of the Cornelius F. Kelley research fellowship in ore dressing at Montana School of Mines, thumbed the pages of a faded letter.

The epistle, apparently written hastily, is dated Venice, April 27, 1819, and is addressed to Monsieur Galligani, at that time publisher of the Messenger, Paris.

Byron, the letter would indicate, was incensed that the Messenger should advertise a book, "The Vampire," as the work of his hand in part he wrote:

"If the book is clever, it would be base to deprive the real writer, whoever he may be, of his honors, and if stupid, I desire the responsibility of nobody's dullness but my own."

Byron further wrote that he had a personal dislike for vampires, and "the little acquaintance I have had with them would by no means induce me to divulge their secrets."

This vein of humor and ruffled temper again is displayed toward the end of the letter.

"I assure you that I know nothing of the works in question, and have the honor to be (as the correspondents to magazines say) your constant reader and very 'Obed' humble servt."

A vampire, at least in Byron's day—was thought to be a blood sucking ghost.
