LADY BROKER SENT TO JAIL

CHICAGO, May 8. (UP) — Mrs. Milda Schroeder, regarded for years in La Salle street as one of the most brilliant of women financiers, was sentenced today to serve from one to ten years in prison for embezzlement, which the state said would amount to more than \$600,000.

Mrs. Schroeder pleaded guilty to a second charge of conspiracy to defraud and was sentenced to serve one to five years. This sentence, however, will run concurrently. Mrs. Schroeder dealt in stocks, bonds and mortgages. She was accused in 14 separate cases of cheating her clients, the women. Mrs. Rose — a prominent attorney — had fleeced her of \$333,000.

BREAD, GAS HIT NEW LOW

SAN FRANCISCO, May 8. (UP) — Bread sold for three and a half cents a loaf and gas for seven cents a gallon here today as price wars continued to benefit the consumer.

Both figures were record lows for the city. Three large chains of grocery stores began cutting bread prices a week ago.

The price for a pound loaf was ten cents. Each day there has been a reduction, until today two of the chain stores offered bread for four cents. The third entered the fray and sold two loaves for seven.

SIDE STEP WAR DEBT ACT AT COMMERCE PARLEY

WASHINGTON, May 8. (AP) — What the International Chamber of Commerce will be asked to say on war debts at the concluding session Saturday remained unanswered tonight when the resolutions committee failed completely to iron out differences on a major resolution embodying the viewpoints of all the national group representatives.

AVOIDS COMMENT
George Theunis, of Belgium, the chairman of the resolutions committee, said the question of international settlement may perhaps be mentioned in a general way in a resolution but declined any further comment.

Silas Strawn, president of the American Chamber of Commerce, also refused to discuss the probable contents of the resolution, but said it would cover nearly everything on the program of the session which includes war debts, tariff, silver, agriculture and scores of less important subjects.

SILVER PLAN APPROVED
The resolution proposing a world conference on silver was approved by the resolutions committee and will reach a vote of the entire convention Saturday.

This conference has been urged repeatedly by Nevada representatives in congress.

DUO ROBBS L. V. WOMEN IN CAR

Local officers were attempting today to find some clue to the identity and location of two thugs who Friday night stopped and robbed two Las Vegas women on the highway several miles south of the city.

The women robbed were Mrs. M. Higgins, who was visiting Mrs. L. B. Sandall. According to their story, officers their less was estimated at more than \$2,000 and included three diamond rings, taken from Mrs. Higgins, and a small amount of money. The women were riding out along the Searchlight road late at night, and started to turn around where the new government road intersects. Before their car could get under way, two masked men stepped up, one menaced the women with a gun and they were forced to relinquish the wheel of the car.

Conducted by the thugs, they were driven down the road, turned off on a side road and their rings ripped from their fingers. The men then attempted to take the car, but heeded the pleading of the women, commanded them to stay in that spot for a half hour and disappeared in the darkness. The women waited several minutes, returned to town and reported the robbery. Deputy Sheriff McCubrey immediately started to investigate the case and tracked the thugs for some distance but their trail later was lost in the sand.

APPLICATIONS FOR BOULDER BUSINESS COMING

WASHINGTON, May 8. (AP) — More than 3,000 applicants for concessions at Boulder City will receive application blanks and instructions for filling them out about May 15, it was announced today by former representative Crampton of Michigan, who is in charge of the leases at the government town.

Various businesses to be conducted at Boulder City have been divided into four classes, which include the following:
1. Those of the public utility type where the number would be limited to one only.
2. Those in which the number should be by the nature of the business, limited to a definite number.
3. Those in which no limitation will be placed excepting the law of supply and demand.
4. Individual applications such as those from doctors, lawyers, and other similar occupations requiring little or no investment, and upon which no limit will be placed.
