Tomato Juice Cocktail  
Ham Mousse  
Shoe String Potatoes  
Creamed Peas  
Hot Rolls  
Strawberry Preserves  
24-Hour Salads

Angel Food Cake  
Topped with Peaches

**Tomato Juice Cocktail**  
(Serving Eight)  
3 cups tomatoes  
2-3 cup water  
4 whole cloves  
2 1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 teaspoon paprika  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoon Tabasco sauce  
4 celery leaves  
1 1/2 teaspoon Worcester sauce  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
Mix all ingredients except lemon juice. Cover and boil gently twenty minutes. Press through strainer. Add lemon juice. Pour into glass jar. Cover and chill twenty-four hours. Serve in small glass cups placed on serving plates.

**Ham Mousse**  
(Serving Eight)  
1 1/2 tablespoons granulated sugar  
2-3 cup cold water  
2 1/2 tablespoons butter  
2 tablespoons flour  
2-3 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 teaspoon paprika  
1 1/2 cups milk  
2 1/2 cups diced, cooked ham  
1 1/2 cup diced celery  
2 tablespoons chopped green peppers  
2 tablespoons chopped pimientos  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
1 cup whipped cream  
Soak gelatin in cold water five minutes. Dissolve over pan of hot water. Cool. Melt butter and add flour and seasonings. Add milk and cook until thick, creamy sauce to pour constantly.
