EQUIPOISE AND TWENTY GRAND TO MAKE DERBY DEBUT OF YOUNG MILLIONAIRES

By ORLO ROBERTSON (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, May 9 (AP)—Two young millionaires, each comparatively new to the racing game, set forth in quest of their first Kentucky Derby triumph on May 17 with their hopes pinned on Equipoise and Mate, two of the smartest yearlings to appear under colors last year.



C. V. Whitney's Equipoise and A. C. Bostwick's Mate shown above will run the premier Kentucky Derby for the young millionaires in this year's renewal, May 16, at Churchill Downs. Sonny Workman if in shape, will pilot the Whitney mount. "Pony" McAtee is to pilot Mate.

Equipoise, co-favorite with Twenty Grand in the future books at 4 to 1, will carry the famous Elton Blue and Brown topped silks of C. V. Whitney, while Mate, third choice at 7 to 1, will bear the banner of A. C. Bostwick. The Blue and Brown silks twice were carried to victory when controlled by the late Harry Payne Whitney, but it will be the first appearance in the Kentucky classic for the Bostwick colors.

Although Equipoise is rated as a co-favorite, a big question mark should be written after his name when considering him as a probable winner of the fifty-seventh running of the blue grass feature.

The long striding son of Pennant, which led all two-year-olds in money winning last year, fell a victim of kidney poisoning a short time ago and there is doubt if he can regain his old time form in time to show the way to the country's fleetest three-year-olds.

Mate was none too impressive in his debut as a three-year-old, finishing third behind horses he defeated as two-year-olds. The Bostwick colt closed ground fast in the six furlong sprint, however, indicating he preferred longer races. Although his workouts have not set turfdom talking, he has been slashed from 8 to 1 to 7 to 1 in the future books within the last few days.

JOCKEY BATTLE LOOMS

If the Derby settles down to a race between Equipoise and Mate, the battle of riding skill should be as interesting as the horse race, especially if Raymond (Sonny) Workman is astride the Whitney work.

Linus (Pony) McAtee, winner of the Derby aboard Clyde Van Dusen in 1929 and Whiskery in 1927, is slated to have a leg up on Mate.

Workman probably excels McAtee in the use of the whip but in "Pony" the little Whitney rider will be meeting a jockey that knows every trick of the game and is unsurpassed in generalship and judge of pace. Should the Mate-McAtee combination win, the latter will join Earl Sande and Ike Murphy as the only jockeys to ride three Derby winners.

There is some doubt, however, that Workman will be fully recovered from his broken leg in time to mount Equipoise.

In case "Sonny" is not able to throw a leg over Equipoise, the mount will go to Arthur "Slim" Robertson, second-string rider for the Whitney Stable and at present Maryland's ranking jockey.
