**Bonds Defeated Canvass Shows**

**COUNT OF CITY BOARD SHOWS ISSUE LOST BY 228**

Technical Results Not Believed True Attitude of City  
Stevens Starts Study Of Legal Situation In Regard to Vote

The canvass of the votes cast at the city election May 5, made by the city commissioners at their meeting yesterday showed that the sewerage bonds were defeated by 228 votes.

**ANNOUNCED BY AGE**  
The returns made by the various boards of the nine city precincts called 737 "yes" and 965 "no" on the bond question.

**ANOTHER POSSIBILITY**  
Also it was thought quite possible that some of the boards might have counted the ballots on which the voter stamped out the "no" votes against the bonds.

It was evident that in some precincts the election boards counted crossed off words, either "yes" or "no" on the ballots with regard to the sewerage question; in other precincts the boards counted the words not crossed off. By check of the tally books and judged technically, the bond issue lost.
