WATER RATE SCHEDULE

THE LAS VEGAS Land & Water company has proposed a new schedule of water rates for Las Vegas. Not for many years has there been any change of moment in the

Las Vegas has been in a fortunate position as to water and water rates for the past 26 years. The rate for an ordinary home and 50 foot lot has been \$1.50 per month with free and unrestricted use of water for lawns and gardens.

During the past two or three years the company has been compelled to make expensive replacements and numerous important extensions of its mains. In addition to that they built a large storage reservoir as an emergency measure. It is possible that these expenditures have been such as to justify an increase in rates.

Be that as it may, the people of Las Vegas should make a study of the proposed rates as they effect various classes of property and submit their findings to the Public Service commission.

In a change of such importance it is desirable that the commission act in the fixing of rates. Its decision will be such as to provide the company with reasonable returns upon its investment and at the same time protect the property owners from extortionate rates.

The subject will be approached by both sides, we believe, in the spirit of harmony and cooperation. It is obvious that the company cannot continue to give good service on inadequate revenue. It is equally obvious that the rates as applied to the various classes of property should be fair and equitable, each bearing its own share of the burden of increase if any is found necessary.

JUDICIAL DUTIES

TUDGE EDWARDS has reminded us that our judicial duties should be taken seriously. And that jury duty is a solemn obligation which is not to be escaped lightly. Also that any one who does not pay due respect to the obligation is apt to be sorry.

We are reminded that most of us complain bitterly if we are compelled to serve jury duty. We tell the judge our business will be ruined and everything shot to pieces. When the truth is that a little inconvenience is generally the only ill effect.

But how we would howl should we be told that we would no longer be permitted to serve on juries! It would be almost as bad as taking the franchise from us, although only about 50 per cent of us go to the polls on election day.


