PLANES READY FOR "BATTLE"

DAYTON, O., May 13. (P)—Bivouacked in scattered air fields over the country tonight were six hundred planes of the army air corps, ready for their final hops which will begin here tomorrow and Friday for the annual army air maneuvers.

Poor flying weather delayed some of the flights to the eastward today, but all planes were expected to reach their destination not later than Friday when the organization of various units will be formulated for the defense of Detroit and Chicago early next week.

MORROW GIRL IS ENGAGED

BATON ROUGE, La., May 13. (P)—Miss Myrtice Roddy announced here tonight that her brother, the Rev. Clyde H. Roddy, of Clinton, La., is engaged to marry Miss Elizabeth Morrow, daughter of Senator Dwight Morrow of New Jersey and sister-in-law of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh.

Roddy is the pastor of the First Presbyterian church at Clinton. He is a graduate of Yale and the Union Theological Seminary and the Southern Methodist university. He is thirty-two years of age.

They have been engaged exactly one month and plans for their wedding have not been completed yet, said Miss Roddy.

HAVANA, May 12 (AP)—Havana these days is actively laying plans for handling one of the most concentrated invasions of "visiting firemen" in the ancient city's history.

Although one of the most popular stamping grounds in the world for "visiting firemen," as members of the American colony refer to the many guests they are called upon to entertain, Havana soon is to play host to bona fide visiting firemen.

These guests will be members of the International Fire Chiefs Association. They are expected to arrive here 2,000 strong and will take the town over October 13-16, inclusive for their annual international convention.

The firemen, incidentally, could hardly have chosen a more appropriate city for their meeting. Here there is but little chance that their hosts, the members of the Havana Fire Department, will be interrupted by the call of duty. Fire department figures for the fiscal year 1929-1930 show that there were 22 fires, and one false alarm. Property damage totaled less than \$125,000. This fine record is largely due to the fact that Cuban cities are built entirely of stone while Cuban homes use no curtains, rugs or other draperies.

The fire chiefs will arrive in special trains to Key West, Florida, where they will board the new P. and O. steamer, "Florida," for the trip to Havana.

Japanese Women In Revolt List 'Don'ts' For Husbands

TOKIO, May 13. (P)—Japanese women have grown weary of the centuries old custom of "yesing" their men folk all day long. In the new order of affairs the formerly demure, kimono clad wife has become so bold that she even dares to give her husband advice now and then.

The Fujokai, or Women's World, in its stand for more rights for the housewife, has compiled a code of laws for husbands, covering jealousy, finance, home administration, health, clothing, food, children and other subjects.

Some of the "don'ts" for husbands, as arranged by the women staff members of The Fujokai, follow:

"Don't be a killjoy all your life. Crack a joke once in a while, even if it isn't very funny. Why confine your wisecracks to your friends?"

"Don't crack your chopsticks against the bowl while eating. You're apt to get on your wife's nerves."

"Don't ignore her wishes. If she suggests that you go together to a department store, go even though you can think of nothing quite so boring. On the way back, stop for some thing to eat or drink. She'll like that."

"No matter how much you love your wife, give her a vacation from you now and then. Never loaf about the house all day, you may be in the way."

"If she happens to look pretty, don't forget to tell her so. If she isn't particularly pretty, tell her so anyhow. It won't hurt you."

"Don't forget her birthday. Stage a little celebration of it each year."

"Don't reprimand her bitterly when she has simply forgotten to sew a missing button on your clothes. She'll snap back at you and then something is bound to happen."

"Never lie to your wife. You mustn't get her in the habit of disbelieving you. Some day you may really want her to believe you."

"Remember that your wife has a right to an opinion, too. Of course it may be wrong, but it's hers anyhow."

TO OPEN BIDS ON DAM LINES

Bids on the construction of power lines from the Southern Sierras substation at the Boulder dam site to Boulder City will be opened here at the U. S. bureau of reclamation office at 2 p.m. tomorrow.

These lines are designated to take part of the reduced current from the station back to the city for power and light consumption at a smaller voltage. Estimates on the contract are also to cover cost of constructing power and telephone lines from the transformer station to the pump site downriver.
