

### RESOLUTION IS ADOPTED BY EMPLOYEES AT MEET

Hoover dam, and "Whereas, the executives have made expenditures of close to \$400,000 in making the Los Angeles & Salt Lake unit, capable of delivering a most dependable service, and "Whereas, we take pride in the cooperation of the Union Pacific system in the welfare of Las Vegas and our part therein as workers and employees of the Union Pacific system, and "Whereas, we are deeply appreciative of the support given the Union Pacific system by the business men, merchants and all business interests of Las Vegas, and "Whereas, we are loyal Union Pacific employees and equally loyal citizens of Las Vegas, and the interests of Las Vegas and the Union Pacific system are one and the same with our responsibilities each to the other, and "Whereas, unregulated trucks operating in unfair competition to the Union Pacific system have created a serious situation to the detriment of all citizens of Las Vegas including its principal taxpayer, the railroad, and that these trucks operate by barrier and trade methods which result in increased expenses, while the railroads are subject to the most rigid regulations of any industry, thus creating a serious situation which is a violation of the American spirit of fair play, and "Whereas, the unregulated operation of these trucks has resulted in decreased traffic to the railroads and decreased revenues, in turn resulting in increased rates and through no fault of the railroads in reduced payrolls and purchasing power, all to the detriment and serious harm to the city of Las Vegas, to the Union Pacific, and to us as employees, and **START MOVEMENT** "Whereas, it has come to our attention that our friends and fellow citizens of Las Vegas have voluntarily started a "back to the rail" movement, to obtain the shipment of every possible pound of freight by rail, and "Whereas, we regard and appreciate this movement as a splendid example of community self enterprise and help, and that it illustrates the forward-looking and broad-gauged attitude of neighbors and friends, "Therefore be it resolved, that we, as employees of the Union Pacific system and citizens of Las Vegas, help those who help us; that we will support our friends with our patronage 100 per cent in purchasing all necessary living requirements from the merchants of Las Vegas; that we as individuals will encourage the shipment of all freight and passengers via the Union Pacific system; that we will all upon our friendly fellow business men to encourage them to ship by rail and to encourage their consignors to ship by rail; that we as employees will use every effort to furnish even better and more efficient and courteous service; and finally that we consider ourselves integral parts of the community of Las Vegas and that we will continue to devote every effort to achieve the goal of a greater and more prosperous Las Vegas as workers and employees of the Union Pacific system.

### TROOPS MEET REBEL FORCE

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, May 15 (AP)—Federal troops at emptying to deal a death blow to the northern Honduran revolt movement clashed with rebels last night at Macuelizo, in Quinistan valley.

The battle lasted all night and the federal troops emerged victorious this morning, routing the insurgents, the general staff announced. There were more than fifty casualties and fourteen federals were killed.

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### TERROR REIGN ENDS WHEN LIONESS CAUGHT

The reign of terror at Spruce Mountain has ended.

It came to a close Monday when Rufino Bena, government trapper, aided by Gordon Griswold, trapped and killed two mountain lions. One was a monster, while the other, although smaller, had accounted for many hundreds of dollars in lambs. Another mountain lion was taken by Bena a few days previous and its skin was brought to Elk yesterday. The others had not been skinned when they arrived here and the animals caused considerable interest throughout the city.

In a letter directed to the Free Press, Gordon Griswold says: "Rufino Bena, government trapper, working with us, has just made a remarkable catch, consisting of three mountain lions. He caught them with the use of traps and trailing dogs, after a great deal of hard work and steady going."

The lions have caused a great deal of damage in the past years, among the live-ock and deer. You will recall the story you carried last fall about the deer which was killed with its young and the one hundred lambs killed in one night.

"The biological survey department deserves a great deal of credit for this work as does Rufino Bena. Besides the lions he caught eighteen wildcats and eight coyotes since the first of April, says the Free Press."

"We estimate that the damage caused in our county alone by these lions would run into the thousands of dollars."

Bena explained that the lions were caught in traps with drags attached to them. If the traps are fastened down the lions will escape their way out. They drag the loose traps after them in an effort to escape. The drags are then set to the trail and after the animals are found they are shot.

### MRS. BASAKER TRIAL IS SET

Mrs. Margaret Basaker, formerly of Los Angeles, and now a resident of that portion of the Mesquite valley lying in Inyo county, Calif., was arrested on a warrant issued on complaint of W. L. Aplin of Las Vegas for "attempt to kill" and taken to the Inyo county jail at Independence, Cal. Mrs. Basaker is the mail carrier on Star route, from the Kingston postoffice to the Goodsprings, Nevada post-office.

The preliminary trial took place April 13 and the case was continued to June 22.

Mrs. Basaker is out on surveillance until that date, having received a warning from the court to keep off private property and to neither carry a gun nor attempt to use one. The court also instructed the sheriff of Inyo county not to issue any permit to Mrs. Basaker to carry a gun in that county and informed her that a letter would be sent to the sheriff of San Bernardino county for the cancellation of the permit which she recently secured to carry a gun in that county.
