U. S. OFFICER DIES IN CAVE

TOURS, France, May 20. (AP)—Ruins of the Stone age cavern in which he perished in a futile attempt to save the life of a peasant woman, today gave up the body of Brigadier General Robert H. Dunlap, a United States marine officer. After almost twenty-four hours of digging rescue workers headed by French army engineers, came upon the mangled form of the American officer where he was trapped yesterday by a landslide which engulfed the cave near Cino Mars where the woman and her husband made their home. The body of Denis Briant, husband of the woman, who rushed with Brigadier General Dunlap to save her as the fall of rock and stone started, also was recovered. Miss Briant was rescued alive but badly injured.

Helping the Homemaker

By LOUISE BENNETT WEAVER SOUR CREAM CAKE

- Breakfast Orange Juice, Chilled Cooked Wheat Cereal and Cream Poached Eggs on Toast Coffee Luncheon Fruit Salad French Dressing Cottage Cheese Sour Cream Cake, Frosted Tea Dinner Chicken Creole Buttered Green Beans Bread Plum Jelly Hot Biscuit Rhubarb Conserve Head Lettuce French Dressing Cherry Roll Coffee

- Sour Cream Cake (Very Tender) 1 egg 1 cup thick sour cream 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 teaspoon nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup sugar 1 1/2 cups flour 1 teaspoon soda Beat eggs and add rest of ingredients. Beat three minutes. Pour in loaf pan lined with waxed paper. Bake 35 minutes in moderate oven. Cool and frost.

- Caramel Pecan Frosting (Suitable for White or Yellow Cakes) 1 cup dark brown sugar 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup milk 2 tablespoons butter 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cup broken pecans Mix sugar, milk and butter. Cook over moderate fire and stir frequently until soft ball forms when portion is slowly poured into cup of cold water. Set aside 15 minutes. Do not touch nor stir. Add vanilla and beat until creamy. Add nuts and carefully frost cake.

- Chicken Creole (Using Leftovers) 3 tablespoons butter or chicken fat 4 tablespoons flour 1 cup chicken stock 1 cup tomatoes 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 1/2 cups diced, cooked chicken 3 tablespoons chopped green peppers 2 tablespoons chopped onions 1/2 cup cooked rice 1/2 cup cracker crumbs 2 tablespoons butter, melted Melt three tablespoons of butter and add flour. When blended add stock and tomatoes. Cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add salt, chicken and seasonings. Add rice. Pour into shallow, buttered baking dish. Sprinkle with crumbs which have been mixed with melted butter. Bake twenty minutes in moderate oven. Serve in dish in which baked.

GUIDING YOUR CHILD

By MRS. AGNES LYNE HIS FEELING FOR BEAUTY

In nothing do children vary more than in their sensitiveness to beauty. A keen pleasure in harmonies of color and sound, a feeling for beauty in any form, is a precious asset, yet often the child's natural sensitiveness to these things is dulled because of lack of opportunity for esthetic experience.

Pictures that delight his eye should have their place in his room. His room should be made as attractive as possible. In choosing his clothing, his own preference in color and design should have as much consideration as is practical.

With the approach of the pleasant seasons, walks in the countryside and work in the garden offer endless opportunities for the development of whatever pleasure in the loveliness of nature he is capable of feeling.

Nearly every child is at least somewhat responsive to music. The kinds of records that are played and the types of music heard on the radio influence the quality of his appreciation. Much of the world's great music can be enjoyed even by little children. Groups of fine records which have been especially selected for children can be obtained in music stores.

Wherever it is possible, the child's esthetic appreciation should be made something more than a passive acceptance. The keenest satisfactions usually come to the child in connection with his own activity.

He will love best of all the flowers that he himself has picked or planted. The birds and flowers which he discovered in the spring woods will mean much more to him than those that are pointed out in picture books or seen through the bars of cages.

He should have paints and crayons so that he can enjoy colors and designs of his own making.
