

Race Should Cheer Campus Reformers

NEW LONDON, Conn., May 20. (AP)—In this era of "big tails" and so-called "over-emphasis," the annual Yale-Harvard regatta would warm the heart of every reformer of college athletics.

A college boat race is staged at the cost of several thousands of dollars, due to the necessity of maintaining expensive quays and to the high price of rowing equipment.

Gate receipts to offset the expense are practically nil. The only revenue received by the university is 10 per cent of the receipts from 3,500 tickets on the two observation trains.

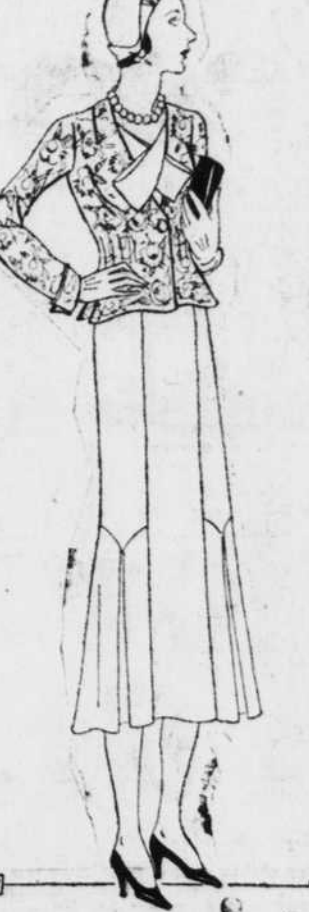

REVIVAL OF RIVALRY BETWEEN HELENS STILL A POSSIBILITY AT WIMBLEDON

BERKELEY, Cal., May 20. (AP)—If the two Helens of tennis—Mrs. Moody and Miss Jacobs—face each other in the finals of the 1931 Wimbledon tournament, the encounter will add a new chapter to their rivalry.

London dispatches a tributed Helen Wills Moody's supposed last-minute decision to compete once again for the most prized of all titles to her desire to equal Suzanne Lenglen's record of five wins at Wimbledon.

But it is pointed out that the number of Suzanne's victories can hardly be regarded as a secret discovered by America's queen of tennis just in time to enable her to enter the lists.

Consequently California tennis followers are casting about for other factors explaining the situation. The negotiations for a possible moving picture career are cited as providing a logical explanation of Mrs. Moody's indecision regarding European play, but back of this they believe lies the controlling reason—the rivalry between her and Helen Jacobs.

With Mrs. Phoebe Watson out of competition because of illness, declared W. C. "Pop" Fuller, first coach of both the Helens, except for the fathers of the two girls, "Helen Jacobs in my opinion would rate a ninety-five per cent chance to win the singles. Against Mrs. Moody well, I think it will be four or five years yet before any woman player appears who can defeat her."

Miss Jacobs had left for the east en route to Wimbledon, before her intimation came from London that Mrs. Moody might, after all, play in the English tournament supreme.

Dating back to girlhood days, the rivalry between the two Helens has grown in intensity through the years. It has crystallized into a transcending formal politeness in their intercourse both on and off the courts.

Neutral in his sentiments as between his two former pupils, "Pop" Fuller, coach of the Berkeley tennis club, believes, however, that the younger Helen—there is a difference of three years in their ages—has not yet progressed to the point where she can expect to beat Mrs. Moody.

Their games are a good bit alike. As to service there is not much choice. Mrs. Moody's forehead is the best in the game. Their backhands are about even, with Mrs. Moody having perhaps a shade. The latter is a little faster on her feet, but Miss Jacobs, who has cut fifteen, to eighteen pounds from her weight, is gaining speed daily.

In the matter of temperament, Mrs. Moody has it on anybody in tennis—she has nerves of iron. It is next to impossible to "get her goat." On the other hand, Miss Jacobs is apt to be disturbed by something that happens in the audience or on the court—to let criticism bother her. This isn't so noticeable when she is playing anybody else but Mrs. Moody, but against the latter Mrs. Jacobs starts out with about a 34-point handicap—its pure psychology, largely.

With the possible exception of Mrs. Watson, Miss Jacobs has demonstrated her supremacy over all other women players except Mrs. Moody and Old Mon Psychology. She has never been able to beat these two. It's been this way ever since I used to coach them as children—always on different days of the week, for the two would rarely play together.

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MINES BUREAU REPORTS ON NEW GOLD STRIKE

ates Masson valley from Smith valley.

NO RUNNING WATER There is no running water at the discovery. An old shaft about 15 feet deep a few hundred feet north and somewhat higher, supplies a seepage in the bottom, but said to be dry at times. The heaviest flowing springs are located four miles west across Spring canon.

LOCATED IN RAVINE The gold discovery is located in a small flat, dry ravine, about one-half mile long, which trends northerly and empties into a large, flat dry ravine named Spring canon. The exceedingly rich gravel is found about two-thirds of the distance up this little ravine, and in a shallow water trap formed by a slightly higher rise of harder rhyolite tuff across the ravine. This natural feature forms a simple concentrating device, similar to a large gold pan. While much of the gold undoubtedly passed over it and down into the ravines below, the coarse gold which was retained is proof of its efficiency.

The rich spot is about 50 feet long and 10 feet wide, and it is a veritable treasure room. On top of a rough, light-colored rhyolite bedrock lies a thickness of four to six inches of very sticky, brown adobe clay, intermixed with sand and small angular gravel, and covered with a few inches of loose, unconsolidated sand and grit.

"DOLLAR A PAN" The clayey pay dirt is said to yield "a dollar to the pan." The owners put about five cubic feet of it through a small concrete mixer, and after dissolving out the clay, after which the sand and gravel was concentrated, and reported that it yielded \$5 in gold, plus a considerable amount of gold-bearing black sand concentrate. Samples panned at the state mining laboratory were exceedingly rich in coarse gold.

A proper development campaign may show that much of it can be worked at a profit. As yet there has been very little prospecting, and no work worthy of note.

FINDS NUMEROUS According to the owners, pincer gold is found in numerous places in little gullies and depressions high up on the rhyolite hill east of the rich ravine. Some of this finely divided gold may have originated from the erosion of veinlets in the rhyolite of which little evidence has been left behind.

A search for the source of the gold revealed a bed of washed gravel about 200 feet west of the discovery ravine. This gravel had been steeply tilted to the west by folding, or by intrusive volcanic masses. The gravel stratum is about five feet thick and it dips under the hillside on which it outcrops, at an angle of 56 degrees. The pebbles are rounded from water-wear, and range in size from one-half inch to six or more inches in diameter.
