CREATES VOICE WITH PEN; TRANSFERS IT TO FILMS

LONDON, May 21. (AP)—A young British sound engineer, E. A. Humphries, believes he is on the trail of the ideal talkie voice.

Humphries is a sound expert with an American film subsidiary here, and part of his job is to secure good sound reproduction. In studying the sound tracks of films to discover why some reproduced well and others didn't, he decided to make the voice of his own and perhaps uncover some of sound's secrets.

Humphries chose the words "all of a tremble," dissected them into their various sound components, then drew these sounds on a long strip of paper. This was photographed on a celluloid film and run through a talkie projector. The words were reproduced in a deep bass tone. The job took him about 100 hours.

Now, Humphries believes, by studying sounds which reproduce poorly and comparing them with an artificial "norm" some sort of standard voice may be set.

Vowels and consonants have different characteristics, and of all the letters "a" with its variations is the most difficult he has yet tried to reproduce.

\$10,000 PEST SECRET IS LOST

FRENO, Cal., May 21. (UP)—K. H. Boyajian, local vinedresser, had a remedy for vine hopper that he valued at \$10,000 until the secret leaked out and in one day became valleywide.

The vine hopper is a grasshopper that is particularly destructive to grape vines. Its appearance in destructive numbers comes only a few years back and it became a menacing pest only within the last two or three years.

Since then the problem of subduing the insect has caused a multitude of experiments and has seen the use of literally dozens of different control methods.

Only one has been found effective. That is to plow the hoppers under in the spring before they hatch. The only fault with that method is that some farmers neglect it, and the hoppers that breed on their places swarm to the

FIRST ELEPHANT EXHIBITED HERE 134 YEARS AGO

SALEM, Mass., May 20. (UP)—Now that circus days are here I may interest some folk to learn that the first elephant, the "celebrated Buffon," made his debut in this country in the spring of 1797.

On exhibition at the Essex Institute, a museum here, is the original poster announcing that the "great natural curiosity ever presented to the curious" will be on display at the Marks House "from sunrise to sundown every day in the week." The date on the poster is August 29, 1797.

The announcement, now wrinkled and time-worn, reveals that "the most respectable animal in the world" was first placed on exhibition in Philadelphia in the spring of 1797.

The elephant was brought to this country from Bengal aboard the ship "America," commanded by Captain Jacob Crowninshield, for the sum of \$10,000.

Though referred to in the announcement as a "mercat," the elephant was four years old and weighed slightly more than 3,000 pounds.

Helping the Homemaker

By LOUISE BENNETT WEAVER CHEESE CAKE FOR DESSERT Menu for dinner Baked Stuffed Tomatoes Baked Potatoes Bread Currant Jam Fruit Salad Celery Seed Dressing Cheese Cake Coffee

BAKED STUFFED TOMATOES 6 large firm tomatoes. 1 cu soft bread crumbs 2 tablespoons finely chopped onions 2 tablespoons finely chopped green peppers 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 egg 2 slices bacon, cut fine 1/2 teaspoon paprika Wash tomatoes. Cut off tops and reserve them. With spoon, scoop out part of inside pulp and seeds. Beat egg and add crumbs, seasonings, egg and bacon. Refill cases. Set upright in shallow pan. Add 1 inch water and bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Baste frequently during baking.

Celery Seed Dressing. 1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon dry mustard 1 teaspoon paprika 1 teaspoon celery seed 1 teaspoon finely chopped onions 1/2 teaspoon white pepper 6 tablespoons sugar 5 tablespoons vinegar. 1 cup salad oil Mix ingredients in wide mouthed bottle. Cork tightly and shake three minutes. Chill. When ready to serve, shake well and pour over arranged salads. This dressing will keep indefinitely if stored in very cold place. Dressing blends well with fresh vegetable salads.

Cheese Cake 2 cups zweibach (1 package) 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup butter, melted. 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon Roll zweibach until well crumbled. Add rest of ingredients. Mix with fork. Pat down into deep nine-inch round pan. Add filling. Filling: 1/2 cup sugar 2 tablespoons flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup white cream cheese 1 teaspoon vanilla 4 egg yolks 1 cup cream 4 egg whites, beaten Blend sugar, flour, salt and cheese. Add vanilla, yolks and cream. Beat two minutes. Fold in egg whites. Pour into pan. Bake one hour in moderately slow oven. Cool and serve.

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GUIDING YOUR CHILD

A child's birthday party is one of those fixed events on the calendar which is looked forward to many weeks in advance with all the intense anticipation of which childhood is capable. It is the child's own day, as important in his eyes as Christmas itself.

The birthday party means most to the child who is able to do some work and planning for it himself. If he is old enough he will enjoy writing his own invitations and mailing them himself. He will want to choose his decorations for the table. Very likely his taste will not result in anything as pretty as would mother's but after all it is he who is to be pleased.

Probably he will want to invite every child he knows but here mother must use her judgment to

limit the number to only so many children as the house can conveniently hold and as will not make too exciting an afternoon.

At a small child's party there should not be more than a half a dozen children. Even older children will usually have a better time if there are not too many of them.

The refreshments should be, of course, the thing that children like best. There is no harm in second and even third helpings of ice cream and cake, providing lemonade, cocoa, cookies and candies are not indulged in also, to make trouble for the digestive system. Children come to a party expecting to be entertained, and although they would be able to invent satisfactory games for themselves in an afternoon of informal play, on this occasion they expect special games and prizes planned in advance for the special day.
