JUNK GOES MODERNISTIC A modernistic hilltop home has been made more so by its occupant, Ralph Bellamy, who staked an open cupboard on either side of the big living room until he got an idea. In a junk yard he found two automobile crankshafts and had them nickel plated. These he stood on end, one in each cupboard. One's first impression upon viewing these two ordinarily prosaic pieces of machinery is that they are ultra-modernistic statues in the boldest Hollywood manner.

CONCRETE AND COPPER The house itself, designed by the noted architect, Frank Lloyd Wright, is unusual. On four levels, it is made almost entirely of concrete and copper. The metal, in hollow strips, is finished in dull green; inside the copper doors, window sills and decorations have a dull, natural color. From a distance, the effect of the green copper and concrete makes the residence look like a sprawling mausoleum. Its exterior belies its interior. Within it is comfortable and homely.

TOMBS LINK ARAB PERIOD TO PAST CHRISTIAN ERA CAIRO, May 23. (P)—Science poking an explorative finger into the history of the upper Nile valley and the first season's work of the archeological survey of Nubia has produced much new material. The survey, under Prof. Monneret de Villard, investigated two large towns. Three large cemeteries also were discovered, with the tombs surrounded by small domes on pillars. This last feature is very important from the standpoint of history, as this type of architecture shows the transition from the first centuries of the Christian era to the Arab period.
