Subsequently, plaintiff alleged, he failed to answer any of her letters after December 18, 1929, and the following June she visited Las Vegas, demanding that the defendant keep his promise of marriage and that the latter definitely refused, saying that he had changed his mind.

Plaintiff alleged that his neglect, and the failure to go through with their plans, caused her great mental and physical distress, and that she suffered a nervous breakdown, and subsequent poor health as a result.

The attendance was 16,000 and gate receipts were \$25,000.

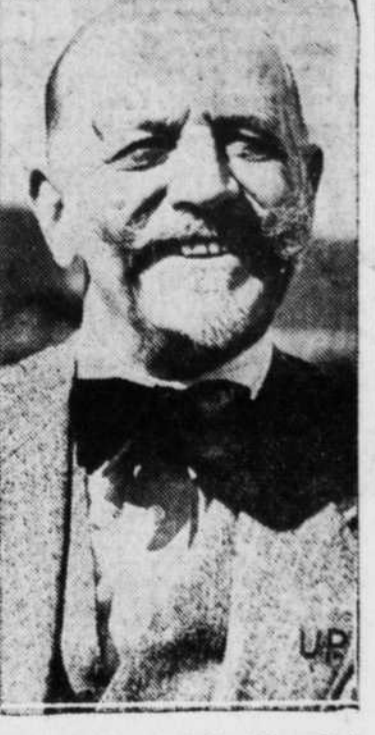

VALPARISO, Ind., May 26. (AP)—A jury of rural Indiana residents found Virgil Kirkland guilty of assault and battery with intent to commit criminal assault tonight only to discover that the sentence therefor was from one to ten years in prison instead of death in the electric chair.

Three of the jurors told a bailiff after they had been discharged that the jury had intended to sentence young Kirkland to death for the murder of his sweetheart, Arlene Draves, who died at a Gary, Ind., gin party last fall.

The situation was unprecedented in the panels of Hooper trials, said Judge Grant Orinpacker. "I am frankly puzzled," he said. "I do not know what to do."
