



"ceiling" the light will form a moving aura on low-hanging clouds above the ship, making its presence discernible at an even greater distance. In all weather the illumination will form a beacon for dirigible or other trans-Atlantic fliers.

The "Empress of Britain" is the equivalent of sixteen stories high from water line to the tops of her three huge stacks, each large enough to hold three Pullman cars. The ship is a city block long. It is expected here on her maiden voyage June 3.


