### NEW "REEFER" CAR STARTED

The special new refrigerator service of the American Railway Express company began with the arrival yesterday morning at 6:52 of the first "reefer" from Los Angeles under the reduced rates recently put in effect.

The car will leave Los Angeles at 8:30 p. m. every night in the week except Saturday and Sunday, reaching Las Vegas at 6:52 the next morning.

Under the new schedule the rate on perishables has been reduced from \$1.95 to \$1.15 per hundred pounds.

An important feature of the new service is the quick delivery of all express shipments. As soon as the car arrives each morning, the express trucks are loaded from the car and take the various shipments to the stores without any delay, giving the merchant a minimum of trouble and direct overnight service from Los Angeles.

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Cal., May 27. (AP)—Revising an old trick: "Use a lockpicking to make a pickproof lock." Harold Marks, burglar, has invented a lock he says he himself couldn't pick unless he knew the secret of its operation.

The lock is so designed that a key will not enter it, once it is locked, unless a secret word is first spelled out by whirling a lettered dial attached to the lock much as a number is dialed on a modern telephone. Marks is serving a term of from five years to life for a burglary committed in San Diego.

### PEOPLE URGED TO ATTEND HEARING

The people of Las Vegas are urged to attend the hearing on the proposed rates of the Las Vegas Land & Water company at the courthouse at 10 o'clock this morning.

It is a matter of the utmost importance that the ratepayers of the city have a full understanding of the situation in order that the action of the public service commission may have the understanding and support of the people. The rates, as finally adopted will be such as, in the opinion of the commission, are necessary to provide a reasonable return for the company on the investment.

Mr. Shaughnessy, chairman of the commission, will welcome all citizens at the hearing so that there may be a clear understanding of the methods commonly used in fixing rates on public utilities.

Protests against and applications for various forms of freight and passenger stage service in the Las Vegas area were heard by the public service commission yesterday and the case taken under advisement. Mr. Shaughnessy said that a decision in the cases would be handed down within a few days.

### FOREST PRODUCTS TAKE THIRD RANK

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., May 27. (AP)—Forest products ranked third in cash production among 31 crop commodities in Tennessee last year. Data arranged by the University of Tennessee department of agricultural economics show that income from forest products was over \$17,000,000. This was surpassed only by cotton and tobacco. The value of forest products used on farms, the survey shows, amounted to \$6,308,900.

### Ultra-Violet Rays Aid Chick Growth

NEW YORK, May 27. (AP)—One ultra-violet lamp, operated at a cost of about 12 cents an hour, will irradiate 100 chickens at a time and may accelerate their rate of growth by about 100 per cent. Dr. Harvey G. Rentschler, director of research of the Westinghouse lamp company, says birds exposed to the rays in a test weighed 20 ounces each six weeks after hatching, while others, given identical food but raised under normal conditions, weighed only 11 ounces.
