

BAN CLAMPED ON FASCIST RAMPAGES IN ROME

Mussolini Sends Word To Cease Actions Against Catholics

Militiamen Guarding Church Property as Precaution Measure

ROME, May 28. (P) — Premier Mussolini today intervened to prevent any further violence by young fascists against members of the Catholic faction organization and against property of Catholic groups. It was understood on excellent authority.

The disorders last night, when the portrait of Pope Pius XI was trampled on the pavement and Catholic books and papers were burned in a fascist attack on a Catholic publishing house, caused the premier to pass the word to students that possible that such action must be curbed.

Special patrols of plain clothesmen were posted tonight in the vicinity of churches and other buildings belonging to Catholic organizations through the city of Rome.

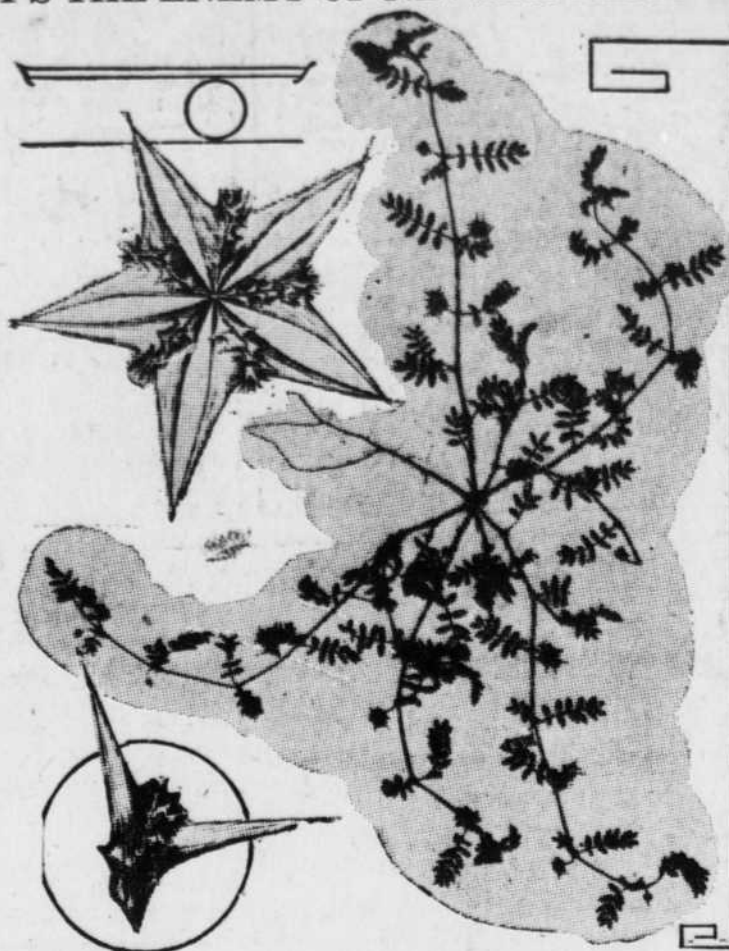
AUTO-GYRO ON HOP TO DIEGO

IT'S THE ENEMY OF NEVADA FARMERS



Because it is a menace to live-stock and field crops, puncture vine, noxious weed, is being fought by the farmers and ranchers of Nevada. The mature bur, one point of which always sticks up, is shown in the upper right, while the lower right is the bur cluster. The mature plant, being the burs, also is pictured.

WEEDS BEING FOUGHT BY RANCHERS IN THIS STATE

The annual battle against weeds in Nevada is now on! From the Colorado river to the state's north boundary, and from Utah to California, farmers, ranchers, extension agents, farm bureau members, county commissioners, the division of plant industry of the Nevada board of stock commissioners, and other private and civic agencies are working to stamp out the noxious weeds.

STARTED YEARS AGO
The campaign, which was begun several years ago when it was realized that such weeds form a serious potential menace to the state's agriculture, is beginning to show results, according to information reaching the Nevada agricultural extension service.

Puncture vine, first of the weeds to be fought in the state, is dangerous both to the farmer and to the motorist, the extension service says. Not only does the weed drive out cultivated crops, but the sharp spines may for use as feed to

livestock. And they penetrate automobile tires, causing puncture, from which the name of the weed, puncture vine, is derived.

The plant has long, trailing, reddish stems, branching from a central crown. The leaves are feathery-like, silvery-green, and are covered with coarse hairs.

BUR CLUSTER
Following the bright-yellow flowers, comes the fruit, in which the chief menace lies. It is a star-shaped bur cluster on a short stem.

When the bur is mature, it splits into five individual burs, each with two spines, one of which always stands upright, ready to puncture any automobile tires which come along.

Seedlings appear continuously through the season, resulting in a succession of plants in all stages from spring to fall.

Automobile tires, livestock hay, bedding, gravel, ballast, irrigation water, and agricultural seeds disseminate puncture vine seeds.

TEXAS-TOKIO HOP PLANNED

FORT WORTH, Texas, May 28. (U) — Plans for a non-stop refueling flight from Fort Worth to Tokyo were announced today by Reg Robbins, former endurance record holder.

Robbins has purchased a Lockheed-Vega plane which is being reconditioned. A \$25,000 prize has been offered by the city of Seattle if the plane is refueled over that city.

Robbins was said to be trying to change the order to permit him to refuel over Nome, Alaska.

A Tokyo newspaper has also offered \$25,000 for the flight.

MEXICAN ACE FORCED DOWN

MEXICO CITY, May 28. (U) — The communication department announced tonight that Leon Diaz, Mexican aviator attempting a non-stop flight from Los Angeles to Mexico City was forced to land at Los Mochis, Sinaloa, at 5:15 p. m. today, because of bad weather. Diaz made a safe landing, it was announced.

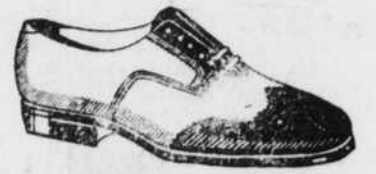
