

NEVADA GIRLS GUARDSMEN WILL SCOUT ICEBERGS PREPARE FOR CONTESTS FROM GRAF ON SUMMER AIR TRIP

With three trips to the far western 4-H encampment, in addition to state championship honors, as incentives, 4-H club girls throughout Nevada are now preparing for the home economics contests at the Nevada Junior Farm Bureau camp, to be held on the campus of the University of Nevada in August.

PRACTICE HARD
Practicing especially hard are the home economics demonstration teams in the various counties, for the team winning that contest will receive \$175 to defray its expenses to Camp Plummer, the far western 4-H encampment, held in connection with the Pacific International Livestock show at Portland, in the fall. The prize is offered by a mail-order company in Chicago.

Nevada Four-Hitchers who are expert in canning are busy, too, putting up fruits, vegetables and meats for exhibit at the camp on the university campus. The state championship in this phase of club work will also receive a trip to Camp Plummer as the gift of a national jar manufacturing firm. Winner of second place will receive \$25 toward a trip to the 1932 Nevada Junior Farm Bureau camp.

Another trip to the Oregon gathering will be awarded to the girl at the Nevada camp who makes and models the best costume for a rural girl at the most reasonable cost. Cotton school dresses, tailored wools, semi-tailored silk dresses, and informal party gowns will be shown. Another Chicago mail order house is furnishing this award.

CLOTHING EXHIBITS
As before, state championship contests will be determined also in clothing exhibits, home improvement exhibits, style dress review judging, meat judging, canning exhibits, and clothing exhibit judging. In the various contests at the Nevada 4-H club camp, the youngsters demonstrate some of the things they have learned in their club work during the year.

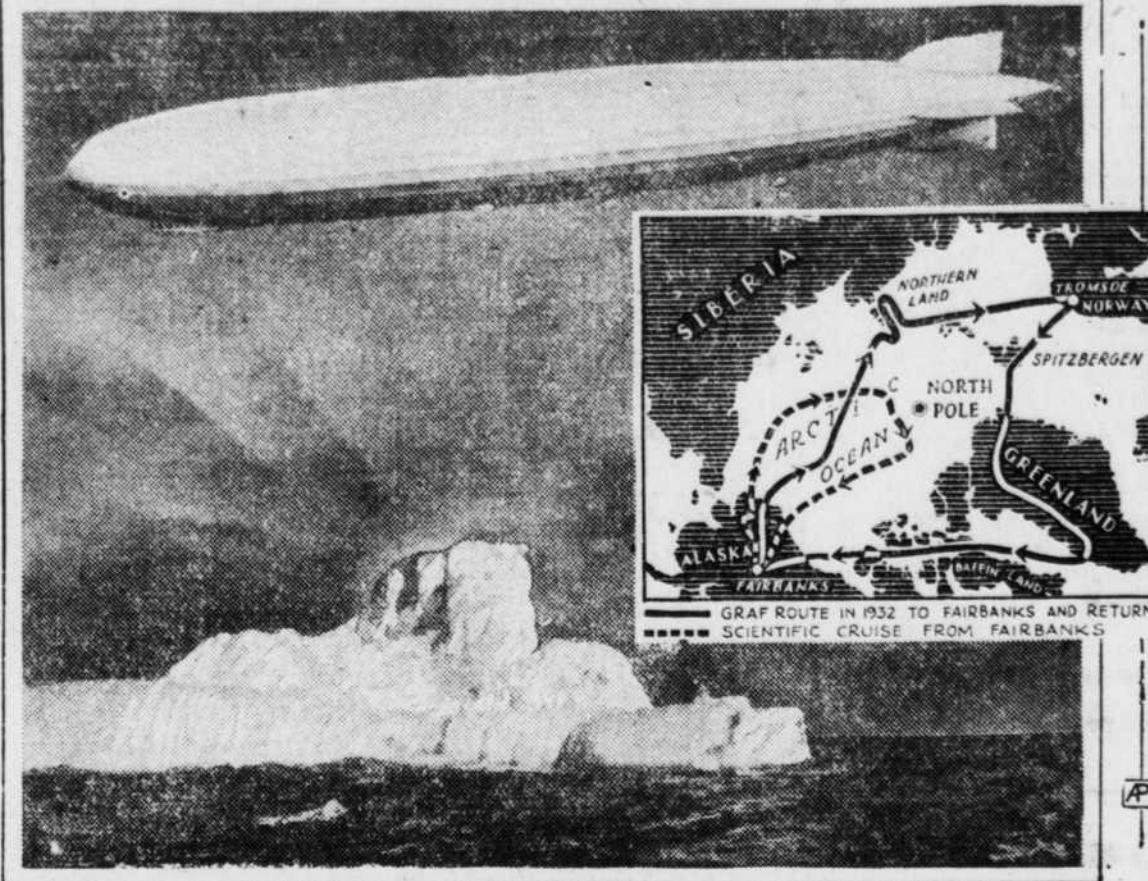
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Movements of the icebergs which come out of the north to imperil shipping are to be studied by an ice expert of the United States coast guard on two Arctic trips to be made by the Graf Zeppelin this summer and next.

WASHINGTON, June 1. (AP)—The coast guard's ice patrol will take to the air in the next two summers, to learn first hand the roving habits of the icebergs that yearly menace north Atlantic shipping.

When the Graf Zeppelin flies to the north pole to meet Sir Hubert Wilkins on his submarine trip under the ice this summer, Lieut.-Comm. Edward H. Smith, the coast guard's foremost ice expert, will be aboard.

On this flight and another planned for 1932, Smith will be seeking icebergs hidden among the hitherto inaccessible glaciers and fjords of Greenland where bergs are born.

Commander Smith has spent six years on board the coast guard cutters that patrol the North Atlantic ship lanes, warning vessels of the approach of icebergs. He has found wide variations in the number of bergs that drift south each summer. It has ranged from 1,300 down to fewer than 100.

What causes this wide fluctuation is still in part a mystery, but Commander Smith has a theory which he hopes to test during his flights over the Arctic.

It is known that the rotation of the earth causes prevailing ocean currents of Baffin bay, west of Greenland, to set toward the east-

ern shore of Baffin island, across the bay.

In years when small amounts of sea ice drift down from the Arctic ocean, Commander Smith believes the icebergs that originate on the Greenland coast are carried across the bay by this current and stranded on the Baffin island shore.

If much sea ice drifts down from the north, however, it piles up on the Baffin island shore instead of the bergs, his theory holds.

The icebergs are then kept out in the main channel, he believes, where they are carried south through Davis strait and cut to the open sea.

For observations on the 1931 flight a special platform will be built on top of the dirigible's huge envelope, where weather observing instruments will be mounted.

Depths of the Arctic ocean will be measured by sonic depth-finding equipment, consisting of a bomb and echo-recording apparatus, which will be lowered into the water on a wire from the zeppelin.

The Graf is to leave Friedrichshafen July 19 for Spitzbergen, to remain tied up there until Sir Hubert Wilkins radios from the Nautilus that he is nearing the pole.

Then the Zeppelin is to start north, guided by Wilkins' radio signals, to meet the submarine.

Next year the Graf will make a

more extensive tour of the Arctic, starting from Spitzbergen and proceeding to Fairbanks, where an international group of scientists will be taken aboard. They will cruise over a wide area between Fairbanks and the north pole. After their return to Fairbanks, the Graf will return to Spitzbergen probably by way of Northern land.
