EPSON, England June 2 (UP)—Their training work finished, 27 bundles of precious horseflesh were bedded down tonight awaiting the bugle that will send them tomorrow off on the one hundred forty-eighth renewal of England's historic derby, with the king, queen, princes and commoners looking on.

The weather was forecast as unfavorable, but the sun shone spasmodically this afternoon. If the rain holds off a mile and a half course will be in fair condition.

Interest in the race is greater this year because of the gigantic sweepstakes. The Irish sweepstakes alone will distribute ten millions of dollars while the Calcutta sweepstakes and smaller organizations will boost the total above fifteen million.

Three physicians were called to attend the crash victims, Dr. Van Meter, Dr. McDaniel and Dr. Bristol. The doctors reported that no one was seriously injured, but that the hurts were painful. The wounds consisted of cuts and bruises on their legs, arms and faces.

BOND IS SET BUT BROKER UNABLE TO GET FUND

Only Second Time In 32 Years Man Under Death Charge Freed

Court Audience Yells When Bond Allowed By Sturzemacher

LOS ANGELES, June 2 (AP)—David Clark was trailing by more than 12,000 votes in the municipal judgeship race with more than one-third of the precincts reporting.

Despite the protest by the state that in 32 years only one person in Los Angeles accused of murder had been granted liberty pending trial, Municipal Judge Carl Sturzemacher fixed bail for Clark at \$100,000.

The action came at the close of Clark's preliminary hearing and after his attorney, W. I. Gilbert, had declared that Clark was anxious that he be held for Superior court trial that he might be acquitted by a jury.

NOT RAISED

The necessary bond was not raised, one of the expected bondsmen declaring that the supposition that he would aid two other bondsmen in raising the sum without charge to Clark was erroneous.

STATE'S CONTENTION

The state contends that Clark went to Crawford's office on the afternoon of May 20 and conferred with the two men. While no motive has been established, it has been hazarded that Clark was involved in an underworld connection opposing Crawford, known as an underworld boss.

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
