

TERRORISM IS ENDED IN N. M.

SANTA FE, N. M., June 2 (UP)—A band of outlaws, mysterious masked riders of the night, who for six years left terror, arson and death in their trail across New Mexico, has been broken up by the arrest and conviction of five of the seven killers.

Felix Lovato, leader of the night-riders, was sentenced to 15 years in the penitentiary. The two remaining members of the band are still being sought.

Like outlaw bands of the old west, the men, spurred and booted, rode their horses down on isolated ranches in the Arriba district, burned, pillaged and sometimes killed.

For six years they terrorized the entire country side although the identity of the riders appeared to be an open secret.

Finally H. C. Martin, a private detective, rounded up the gang and obtained evidence which resulted in their convictions.

DEPLORES BAN ON RACE MIX

BERKELEY, Cal., June 2 (UP)—California's legal attempts to prevent racial mixtures and marriages has been a failure, and whatever law has been tried to step into this province has been unsuccessful, Dr. Max Rudin, professor of law at the University of California, told the racial and citizenship section of the California conference on social work.

Dr. Rudin charged that the California legislation has been mild in itself, but the latest unfortunate ruling was the classification of Filipinos as Mongolians. Dr. Rudin doubts that the courts will accede to this classification.

"Legislatures do not examine the anthropological or biological aspects of the question. They only know that every other race must be inferior to their own," Dr. Rudin said.

Taking up the problem from the biological viewpoint, Dr. S. J. Holmes, professor of zoology, revealed that neither science nor biology has an answer as to whether racial mixtures were advantageous or not.

APE REVEALED; ONLY 'LEGGER

MANSFIELD, Ohio, June 2 (UP)—Residents in the northern section of Richland county may roam the woods at night undisturbed, for the mystery of the "ape" has been explained.

The sheriff's office was notified last September that a huge ape was roaming at large over the northern section of the county. An investigation followed, and several persons, who apparently had a keen sense of imagination testified that they had seen the creature.

The former county sheriff, Aaron Davis, said he had never been really satisfied with the case, and with the hope that something more might be learned about the "monster," continued investigating.

The former sheriff learned the inside story a few days ago.

He related it as follows:

"It developed that the huge ape was a man engaged in bootlegging. He was a short, heavy set individual who was in the practice of hiding his wares in the woods. One afternoon, about dusk, he wanted to get some liquor, and, borrowing his wife's fur coat, he started out.

"He became fearful lest he should attract attention from people nearby and sped from tree to tree as he dodged into the woods. Then he secured his package and escaped."

Aaron said he had been advised that the "ape man" recently had left the county.

NEW YORKER IS STABBED

NEW YORK, June 2 (UP)—Assassins crept into the Brooklyn mansion of Dr. George Edward Deely, 58, a bachelor, and stabbed him to death today after a vain attempt to strangle him as he slept.

Police Commissioner Mulrooney announced that "revenge lies behind the crime."

Deely's bedroom gave mute evidence of a desperate struggle. When found the body bore eight stab wounds. A fine strong wire was loosely drawn about the man's throat and led detectives to believe that the killer probably had tried to strangle Deely.

There are no definite suspects, but former servants of the physician were being sought for questioning in connection with the case.

BUILD STATUE TO COW HAND

BILLINGS, Mont., June 2 (UP)—A cowboy aviator who dreamed of flying the Atlantic and apparently died in the attempt, will have a monument erected to his memory.

The monument bearing the title "Where Dreams Are Born," will be erected in Yakima, Wash., to Urban F. Ditsman, jr. Billings stockman lost on a lone flight over the Atlantic on October 3, 1929.

Unheralded, the cowboy flier took off from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, on the flight. He never was heard of again.

The monument will be modeled after a drawing at the time of the flight by Tise Reynolds of the Portland Oregonian.

The scene depicts a cowboy, mounted, gazing over a broad expanse of range, while above, in the clouds, the airplane, and "The Golden Hind," the ship of Sir Francis Drake.

Ditsman had named his ill-fated craft, "The Golden Hind."
