ITALY TESTS USE OF MOTOR RADIO

ROME , Italy, June 4. (P) - An experiment in mobilization by means of automobiles directed by radio was carried out here and at Ostia

The motorcars, each bearing a sensitive receiver, came from all parts of the kingdom, including the slands of Sardinia and Sicily. Radio stations of Rome and Milan gave them the necessary directions Six hundred of them massed or the road to Ostia, and there Mussolini, driving his own car, headed the column toward the sea. Evolutions along the new searoad at Ostia followed.

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
