Track fans of the Pacific coast are giving some thought to pole vaulting. In a day's travel through southern California many persons may be found who will say that Bill Graber, U. S. C. sophomore, barring injury, should set a new world's record for the pole vault.

Maxwell Stiles, who modestly says he is not an expert, but who as a matter of fact knows as much as any of them about track, comes out flat footedly with the opinion that Graber will hold the world's record and the Olympic championship after the 1932 games.

Dink Templeton, Stanford coach, calls Graber "an astounding athlete," suggesting that he eventually will reach the astounding height of fourteen feet, six inches.

TRACK MEET PLAN FOR 1932 IS READY

BATON ROUGE, La., June 4 (AP)—Plans for an All-Louisiana Collegiate track meet in 1932 are nearly complete, Russ Comen, director of athletics at Louisiana State University, announced.

According to present plans the meet will be a two-day affair, with preliminaries on Friday, April 29, and finals Saturday, April 30. Tulane, L. S. U., Loyola Central, Louisiana Normal, Louisiana Tech, and Southwestern Louisiana Institute will all be represented.

NEW LAW PERMITS 15 ROUND FIGHTS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 4 (AP)—Kansas City and St. Louis are prepared to put in their bids for championship fights, the Missouri boxing laws having been changed to allow 15-round bouts to a decision.

The law, which will go into effect after final adjournment of the assembly, probably in September, was given the approval of Gov. Henry S. Canfield, himself a fight fan.

The greatest pole vault coach in the world is A. C. Gilbert, the toy manufacturer, whose hobby is turning out champions at Yale," says Cromwell.

"I predict that either one of Yale's vaulters or Bill Graber of Southern California will break Lee Barnes' world's record and that no matter what the Elis do, Graber one of these days will clear the bar at fourteen feet, six inches.

"Until I saw Graber clear the bar at thirteen feet, nine inches at Fresno, I had always considered Charles Hoff of Norway the greatest natural vaulter in history. Now I realize that Graber is the finest prospect I have ever seen."

Barnes, the champion, has assisted Cromwell in coaching Graber. The sophomore as a freshman could not clear twelve feet and in the first varsity meet of his career he went out at twelve feet, six inches. In two months he has developed so far that he has become a Trojan hero.
