Boulder Giant Takes Tiger Joe Down In Fast Time

Williams weighed 115 pounds, Erickson 130. The match was to be two out of three falls, no time limit. The match lasted about eight minutes.

The far west is full of major league baseball scouts these days. One meets them in the stands at games, day and night.

The tip is out that at least one of them—possibly more—are looking for a right-handed hitting outfielder for Uncle Robby's Brooklyn Robins.

There are two outfielders, who are right-handed, tearing the cover from the ball in the Pacific Coast league; but whether President York will offer enough money for the release of either seems doubtful. Dave Barbee of Hollywood and Dutch Holland of Seattle would fill the bill. Not only do they hit the ball but they hit it great distances.

In recent years so many Pacific Coast recruits have made good in the major leagues that it is beginning to be an accepted fact that there is less margin of danger in purchase from the far west than in the average minor league deal.

SCOUTS KIDDED

The major league scouts who spend their summers following Pacific Coast league teams have come in for a lot of kidding in connection with the sensational performances of the veteran Russell (Duff) Arlett, who is going places and doing things for the Phillies.

Arlett spent 13 years in the minors waiting for his chance in fast company and he was just as good a ball player ten or 12 years ago as he was when the Phillies bought him from Oakland last year.

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WOOD CUTTER MAY BE LATE

RENO, June 5—Paulino Uzcudun, Basque heavyweight fighter, who battles Max Baer, of California, twenty rounds in Reno on the morning of July 4 may be delayed two days in getting from New York to the Divorce Capital to start his training for the Independence Day melee.

Originally scheduled to reach Reno on June 4, where he was to immediately start conditioning work at Steamboat Springs, Paulino may not reach here until June 6, according to a wire received today by Jack Dempsey from Lou Brix, the Basque's manager.

Part of Paulino's delay, Brix wires, will be due to the big Spanish ex-woodchopper's desire to bring with him to the west coast a new Spanish heavyweight named Juanito Olaquibal. The latter is due to reach New York on June 2 aboard the steamship Ile de France. Paulino claims Olaquibal is "good."

The additional day of delay for Uzcudun will be at Ogden, Utah, where several thousand Basque residents of that vicinity plan to give him a huge reception and have asked that he stay over a day and a night.

The Ogden reception will be only one of several demonstrations for Paulino by Basque countrymen along the route of travel. Delegations are to meet his train at Elko and Winnemucca, Nevada. In Reno Paulino will be met by a brass band composed entirely of Basques and by more than 1,000 of his countrymen, who are planning to give him a demonstrative welcome.

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
