

### BOMBERS ARE SENT TO JAIL

ROME, June 5 (AP)—A special tribunal, for the defense of the state, tonight sentenced six men to prison and freed another, after a one day trial, for responsibility in the bombing which killed twenty persons and injured twenty-three, as King Emanuel inspected the Milan fair in April, 1928.

### WANT ROAD TO NEW HIGHWAY

Request for permission to open a road sixty feet wide and 600 feet long was made of the board of county commissioners yesterday on behalf of Midway City. According to the petition presented to the board, with twenty-four signers, the proposed road would give the settlement, formerly known as Jericho Heights, ingress and egress to the new Las Vegas-Boulder City highway. The board took the matter under advisement to be discussed again June 24.

### VEGAS EX-JUDGE IS BEING TRIED

William H. Harkins, at one time justice of the peace in this city, is on trial in the superior court, at Bridgeport, Connecticut, charged with being an habitual criminal, according to a United Press report. If found guilty, he may be sentenced to life imprisonment. His brother, Reverend H. D. Harkins, claiming that he has been "queer" since crashing his airplane into a tree to avoid hitting a child, will attempt to have him adjudged insane.

### PASTURE WILL OPEN TONIGHT

With free dancing and a big fire barbecue, the Pasture, popular resort four miles east of town on the Boulder highway, will be formally opened tonight. Occupying the same location as the Cool Shade, the new resort has developed much of the little cases that mark it, and an elaborate place is the result. Utilizing the abundance of shade cast by the trees that stud the big outdoor garden, cosy little nooks are scattered about on the grass. In the center of the Pasture is the canopied dance floor; and under another canopy are the croquet, tennis and roulette games for which the management was granted a license yesterday. The Pasture is well lighted with strings of incandescent globes strung about the grounds. The whole is enclosed by an attractive lattice fence, lending privacy to the resort.

### BEEES PAY FOR CLOTHING ON FARM

**BATON ROUGE, La. (AP), (P)**—Louisiana farmers often depend upon a few colonies of bees to buy clothing for members of their families. And they dress well, too, says E. C. Davis, bee specialist of the extension department of Louisiana State University. Davis pointed out that while other crops have failed in past years, there has been no dropping off in the honey crop. "In some instances," he said, "the only money crop some farmers had was from this source."

The extension department expert said that keeping bees in homemade box hives is "as obsolete as plowing with oxen and a wooden plow." Modern apiaries are found throughout Louisiana, Davis added, and beekeeping as a farm side line has just begun so far as its possibilities are concerned.


