"Get The Speakeasy Owner," Orders Of Enforcement Chief

Commercial Violators To Be Objective Of 500 New Officers

WASHINGTON, June 6 (U.P.)—Speakeasies and saloons along with large commercial violators were defined by Prohibition Director Woodcock as the obvious objective of raids by dry forces.

On July 1, five hundred new agents, authorized by congress, will be employed. The commissioner wrote a letter to all new agents saying, "You will direct your forces against commercial violators, speakeasies and saloons. This is the obvious objective of your forces."

HOOVER-NAVY ACHIEVE PACT
